Pre-registration Set Monday-Wednesday, System Streamlined

All students who plan to attend Mercer next quarter must pre-register Monday through Wednesday, February 24-26, university Registrar Columbus Posey announced this week.

Students who do not register on these days will be required to pay a \$5 late fee and have to wait until all other students are registered before their class assignments can be verified.

To pre-register, students should pick up their registration card from their advisor, then pick up their class cards from each departmental office, fill them out and bring them to the registrar's office, Room 102 Administration Building.

Posey said this is the second phase in a three part plan to simplify registration. The next stage would allow pre-registration and payment of fees by mail.

On registration days, March 19 and 20, students will be required only to pick up their cards and pay their fees.

The week's activities will be highlighted by the Greek Week Dance, Friday, February 28 at 8 p.m. in the Walter Little Room of the Dempsey Motor Hotel.

At the intermission of the dance, the winners of the Greek God and Goddess Contest will be announced. Admission to the dance is free, paid previously by an assessment of the organizations. The dance is open to non-Greeks.
