Bears Bomb Mocs

The Mercer Bears, with a tremendous effort from star Bob Reeves, defeated the Mocs from Florida Southern 83-68. Reeves scored a total of 35 points in leading the Bears. It was his high for the season and the third time he has scored more than 30 points this season.

The victory hiked Mercer's record above the .500 mark for the first time this season. The Bears are now 11-10 for the season after making an unbelievable comeback of a 1-7 mark at the first of the season. Mercer has now won 10 out of its last 13 games, which is one of the most constant winning streaks for Coach Wilder's team in many a moon.

Mercer's biggest lead of the contest was 21 points at 72-51 with 6:08 left in the game. Wilcox added 15 points and Baxter 12, while Steve Moody pulled in 13 rebounds. Guard Jack Manton turned in an outstanding defensive performance.
