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with mass education on the large university campus, are of the opinion that the most significant underlying cause for disquiet, is the students' loss of identity, his failure to acquire a sense of belonging . . . and the frustration engendered by reasons of these factors."

He told the assembled students that "there has never been a time in which fraternities and sororities can, if only they will play a more important part in college life than in this day of mass and accelerated education. The need of men of like persuasions to bind together in a bond of friendship has been recognized in all civilizations. There is no time in a man or woman's life when their need for a community of common interests is more pronounced than during their early college years. As wonderful as our educational institutions are, they have been unable to completely fulfill the need of which I speak, with mere brick and mortar."

In conclusion Judge McKenzie said, "I challenge each of you here today, to make a renewed and honest effort to accept your fraternity and sorority as it was meant to be . . . not as a status symbol, not as a sentimental memory carried over from college days, but as a close union of men and women of like aspirations and meaningful aims . . . aims that are, in the final analysis, the very soul and substance of life itself and then to instill in your chapters this same acceptance."

The highlight of Greek Week will come Saturday night, 8:00 p.m. when the Greek Week Dance will be held at the Walter Little Room in the Dempsey Motor Hotel. Entertainment will be provided by Dee Clark, well known singer of the popular hit, "Raindrops." The attire is semi-formal.

At the dance, the names of Greek God and Goddess will be announced. The winners were chosen by a judging staff, composed of faculty and administrative members, from representatives sponsored by each of the social organizations. A trophy will go to each of the winners.
