Bears Down North Georgia, And Petrels Over Weekend

The Mercer Bears returned to Macon from a triumphant weekend Monday sporting a 13-6 overall won-lost record. The Bears defeated North Georgia College in Dahlonega Friday and went on to overcome the Oglethorpe Petrels Saturday afternoon.

In the first game, the Bears racked up six runs, while the North Georgia team made only four. Dewall Waters, pitching 8 1/3 innings, fanned 16 and allowed the four runs on only six hits. He walked three.

Mercer scored first in the top of the first inning when Sandy Harris took first base on an error, only to be forced out at second as Emmett Goodman went to first on a fielder's choice. Jack Manton sent Goodman to third with a sharp single and Goodman later scored on a second North Georgia error.

The Bears' other runs came in the third, seventh and eighth innings, as they scored 2, 2, and 1 in those periods respectively. North Georgia's runs came in the first and seventh innings, as they scored 3 initially and finally one more after a long wait.

Lefthander Ronnie Davis was credited with the win after he relieved Sandy Harris in the seventh inning. This was Davis' fifth win against only two losses. Dennis Hargrove was the losing pitcher.

Richard Jordan led the Bear's hitting attack against the Petrels, going 3 for 4, scoring two runs and driving in two more. Jack Manton and John Collier had two

hits each, while Collier and Lester Wright each drove in two runs.

Oglethorpe's chief threat was Larry Abner, who hit a home run in the third inning and later hit a single. Smith also had two hits for the Petrel team.

Georgia Tech blasted off for six runs in the seventh inning Wednesday afternoon to down the Bears 11-5, giving Mercer a 13-7 record with one game left to play.

Dewall Waters, Mercer southpaw, was charged with the loss, as three Mercer pitches took a turn at trying to stop the Yellow Jacket onslaught. Sandy Harris led the Bears' hitting attack, hitting three of the Bears' six hits and going 3 for 5.

Tech opened the scoring with two runs in the fourth inning, added another in the fifth, two more in the sixth, and cinched the game with six big runs in the seventh. Mercer's scores came in the fifth inning, as they picked up two runs to tie the game; in the top of the sixth, as they managed another to tie the game again; and in top of the ninth as they valiantly attempted a comeback. But the odds at that point were overpowering.

The Bears will meet the Jackets again Saturday at 2:30 p.m. here at Mercer. This will be the last game of the season for the Bears, and if they win they will wind up with a 14-7 record.

Some of the topics discussed were ultraviolet spectrophotometry, infra-red spectrophotometry, gas chromatography, and atomic absorption.
