

# LITTLE ANGELS APPEAR BEFORE MERCER CROWD

The Little Angels of Korea charmed a capacity audience in Mercer's Willingham Chapel Thursday. Organized in 1962, this group of 26 girls and one boy came to Mercer as part of their 1965 fall tour of the United States. Miss Soon Shim Shin was solo dancer and instructor with the group. She is Korea's most celebrated and distinguished dancer.

The group was accompanied by the Court Music Orchestra or "Aak" of Korea, under the direction of Mr. Sunk Ok Park, who was also choreographer for the dances of the group.

Lt. Colonel Bo Hi, Pak introduced the 12 dances performed by the group. All of them were beautifully done, but three of them merit special attention.

The Drum Dance was performed by four girls playing six drums each. The girls wore colorful long gowns of orange, pink, and green, and were amazingly adept at moving from one drum to another and playing two drums at once.

The Festival of Harvest or Moon Festival is an expression of the Korean farmers thanksgiving for a good harvest. All 26 Little Angels participated in this colorful and rhythmic dance. The highlight of the dance was a solo done by the only boy in the group. Mr. Thomas Park, Young Mr. Park danced with a long streamer attached to his cap. As he moved his head the streamer moved about his body in a wide circle.

Children in Korea have no cars, so when they travel, it is usually on the back of an older person, such as a grandfather. Travel by Night was a dance done by a single tiny girl who represented both the grandfather and his little rider. This was done by means of a special costume with a grandfather's head attached to the front and a child's legs attached to the back.

The little girls, ages 7-13, and the one boy, age 14, were enthusiastic about their trip to the United States. Repeatedly heard after the performance were "Thank you velly much", and "I like you—do you like me?"

The girls find English hard to learn, but they have picked up a good bit of the language since they have been in the United States.

They enjoy American food, especially hot dogs, but found it hard to understand that hot dogs are not made of dog meat. When asked if they enjoyed their meal in the cafeteria, the girls smiled and said "Yes—velly much!" The girls also enjoyed fried chicken and potato chips.

The children practice dancing for three hours a day. When asked

if they enjoyed dancing they immediately replied "Yes!"

One of the girls interviewed, Sun Hi Moon, II, explained by means of her hands that she had had long hair. Then she pointed to her short pigtails and sighed soulfully. All of the girls are required to have their hair cut and braided into short pigtails. They put on their thick makeup by themselves.

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# Science Scholars Sought

The National Science Foundation is beginning selection of candidates for the Foundation's program of graduate and regular postdoctoral fellowships.

Fellowships will be awarded for math, physics, medicine, biology, engineering, anthropology, economics, the history and philosophy of science, linguistics, political science, psychology, and sociology. This opportunity is open to college seniors, graduate students working toward a degree, postdoctoral students, and others with equivalent training and experience. All applicants must be citizens of the United States and will be judged solely on the basis of ability.

Applicants for the graduate awards will be required to take the Graduate Record Examinations administered by the Educational Testing Service. They will be given on January 15, 1966, at designated centers.

The grants for students are as follows: \$2400 for the first level, \$2600 for the intermediate level, and \$2800 for the terminal level. The annual grants for postdoctoral Fellows is \$5500. Limited allowances will also be provided to apply toward tuition, laboratory fees, and travel.

Deadline for the receipt of applications for graduate fellowships is December 10, 1965, and for regular postdoctoral fellowships, December 13, 1965. Awards will be announced March 15, 1966.
