of the Mercer Law School, and has rendered significant services to his Alma Mater throughout the year. He served on the board of trustees under three Mercer presidents during the past 30 years, and last January completed a five-year term and also his second term as chairman of the trustee executive committee. He currently is a member of the President's Council and University attorney.

Mr. Martin was one of the organizers of the Mercer Alumni Association, and was vice president in 1938 and president in 1941. He has

been the recipient of the Alumni Award for his work in this area, and in 1966 he was presented the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award for outstanding community service. He served as chairman of a committee to establish the Walter F. George Foundation and to raise endowment funds for the law school, and has engaged in many other fund raising projects for Mercer.

Mr. Martin has been active in civic endeavor, having served as president and commissioner for the Central Georgia Council Boy Scouts of America, member of the Bibb County Girl Scout Council, chairman of the budget committee of the Macon Community Chest, president and national counselor of the Macon Chamber of Commerce, and as vice president of the Commercial Law League of America.
Mr. Alban will be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity for services to the deaconate and for civic leadership. He will deliver the commencement sermon at 11 a.m. June 5, at Mabel White Baptist Church.

A native of Sherman, Texas, he received the degree of Bachelor of Theology from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He has served as pastor of churches in Texas and Arkansas, and for more than 17 years was pastor of Kirkwood Baptist Church of Atlanta. He is presently director of work with National Baptists for the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Mr. Cardwell will be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity for his contributions to the deaconate and to the community, and for his religious leadership. He is a graduate of Shreveport College of West Virginia, and holds the degree of Bachelor of Arts from Emory and Henry College, and the degree of Bachelor of Divinity from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary.

He has been pastor of the First Baptist Church of Macon since August, 1963, and he has served during the past year as president of the Macon Baptist Pastors' Conference, secretary of the Macon Ministerial Association, and as a trustee of Tift College, Forsyth.

Mr. Cardwell has been widely recognized for his outstanding contributions to the field of mental health. He has served as president of the Macon Association for Mental Health, and currently is president of the Georgia Association for Mental Health.
