The Bears Have Five Left

Saturday the Bruins faced the Petrels of Oglethorpe pushing a record to 11 wins over six losses. Though the Bears won the game, they lost a fine freshman first baseman, Spears Westbrook, who dislocated his elbow in the fifth inning.

The invaders from Atlanta were given a one run lead over the slow starting Bears in the top of the first when rookie shortstop, Robert Belloir, threw the ball wide to Westbrook at first and Dick Maher scored from second.

The Bruins and Petrels traded the next four innings with only action by Mike Crook who singled for Mercer. Then in the top of the 5th Doug Cole led off, and hit a liner to Rufus Dowell at third. Dowell threw the ball wide causing Westbrook to move into the Base path to field the ball. As Westbrook stretched, Cole ran into his arm—resulting in Spears injury and terminating his action for the season. On another error the Petrels scored.

Mercer came back behind the bat of Westbrook's replacement, Ray Sullivan. Sullivan singled and Dowell sacrificed moving Ray to second. Richard Jacobs then singled and Sullivan went home. At the end of five innings Mercer was down 2-1. Not till the bottom of the seventh did the scoreboard change, in Mercer's favor. The first batter flew out, then Dowell singled. With Rufus on first, Jacobs and Stewart obtained trips to the bag by way of errors, and Dowell scored. Pierce sacrificed, moving Stewart and Jacobs down. Robert Belloir doubled driving two runs over the plate, pushing Mercer ahead 4-2. The top of the ninth brought little light to the visitors—though they scored one run. Then Steinbeck came to close them out and pressured a 4-3 victory.

Stewart was the winning pitcher, striking out 7 and walking 6. It was his fourth win against only one loss, with a 1.16 E.R.A. Charlie also held the Petrels to only one hit.

Though the record is 11-6, there have been some hard losses for the team.

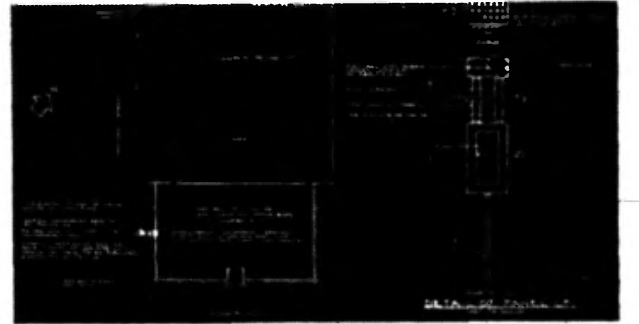
