

FRESHMEN LOSE CLOSE GRID TILT TO BULLPUPPIES

Georgia Freshmen Score in Last Few Minutes of Hectic Battle

ENTIRE CUB TEAM STARS

After fighting the Georgia Bullpuppies on even terms throughout three full quarters and most of the last quarter in Louisville, Ga., last Friday, the Baby Bruins finally had a touchdown pushed over their goal line and Georgia's attempt at goal being successful, lost the game 7 to 0.

The punting of Wilton Alderman for the tube was marvellous and almost overshadowed the defeat. Alderman averaged 65 yards to the punt and at one time punted 70 yards from behind the goal line. In addition to this Alderman played a good game both on the offense and defense.

Georgia's score came in the last few minutes of the game. Mercer fumbled and Georgia recovered on Mercer's 25 yard line. A long pass from Riddle was batted down by Alderman, but was ruled complete by the referee on the grounds that Alderman had interfered with the receiver. On the next play the Georgia back was thrown behind the line of scrimmage for a loss. Then Cook, Georgia quarter-back, took the ball around left end for the only touchdown of the game. Riddle kicked goal.

Next to Alderman's punting the bright spot of the game from the Mercer point of view was the great game put up by the Mercer line. The entire line played so well that it is hard to say which player played the best. The four ends used by Major Blair all showed marked ability. They were, Womack, Nix, Tedder and Henderson. Especially did Tedder and Henderson shine in getting down under punts and stopping plays coming around their ends. Tedder's tackling was deadly and he was in almost every play. Amos Godby, former All-Kentucky prep tackle, exhibited a fine play. However, Godby's play had nothing on that of Luther Ray at the other tackle position. Bubber Burnett and Stovall, who relieved these two tackles, also did themselves credit.

A crowd of eleven hundred witnessed the game and the Mercer authorities are enthusiastic at the interest taken in the game. They say that efforts will be made to play the Georgia freshmen in Louisville again next year. The members of the Mercer team praised the hospitable treatment they received from the Louisville people. They were lodged in private homes and treated with the utmost courtesy.

For Georgia the play of Riddle in the backfield was the feature of the game. Cook who scored the winning touchdown also starred in the Georgia offense. The work of Nixon and Gunnels in the line was unusually good.

On one occasion the Cubs came close to scoring when they missed a field goal and at another time they were held on the Bullpup's 7-yard line.

wide and 205 feet long. The Sport arena (dimensions 90 x 115) will contain 10,350 square feet of space. The completed building will contain 37 rooms. This will include seven offices 16 x 20 feet; twelve class rooms; two parlors and two ladies' rest rooms. The building will have four separate dressing rooms which will accommodate four teams. Quarters for visiting teams will be sufficient for twenty-five men. It will contain a swimming pool with a breadth of 35 and a length of 70 feet. There will be four shower baths and locker space for 1,000 men.

To Have Trophy Room - The auditorium will seat 2,900 people. The seating capacity for basketball games will be 2,500. The sport arena will contain three practise courts.

THREE SELECTED FOR RHODES BID

Charlie Walker, Robert Walsh and Kay Tipton Named to Try From Mercer

Those who were selected to go to Atlanta, December 11, to compete with other students from Georgia universities for the Rhodes Scholarship to Oxford, England, were Robert Walsh, Charley Walker and Kay Tipton.

These were chosen over a number of candidates here on the three-fold basis necessary to Rhodes scholars—scholarship, leadership and athletic ability. In Atlanta they will appear before the state committee of Rhodes Scholars. Before this committee, also, will come men from the University of Georgia, Emory University, Oglethorpe University and Georgia Tech.

One man from these will be named to go to Oxford, where he will be in school three years, with the advantage of traveling over the continent in the summer and with almost \$2,000 for expenses.

The three Mercer men were appointed by the Mercer committee of Rhodes Scholars. Dr. Percy Scott Flippin, chairman, has with him Dr. A. P. Montague, Dr. B. R. Richardson, Dr. Ben. C. Holtzclaw, and Prof. Chas. W. Williams. Dr. Flippin was appointed to this position seven years ago by Dr. R. P. Brooks, state secretary of Rhodes Scholars.

Two of the instructors on the committee that choose scholars from Mercer were Rhodes Scholars themselves. They are Dr. Holtzclaw and Prof. Williams, the former of whom went from Mercer.

Work upon the new chapel will be begun in the near future and it is hoped to have it completed at the beginning of the next school term.

The money is being raised largely through the ministerial students and faculty although outside aid will be accepted and appreciated. The men on the financial committee are C. R. Sanders, Professor Rogers, C. L. Prickett, Julius Spears and H. H. Harvill.

The plan was originated with C. R. Sanders. Being presented to the ministerial association it received the hearty approval of the members and also of Dr. Weaver.

In converting the room that is now a class room into a chapel the walls will be tinted, the windows draped, pews will be installed and rugs put on the floors.
