The celebration this year far surpassed that of last year, being one of the largest social events in the history of Macon's college and debutante set. The costume party of Friday night was attended by close to seven hundred guests, each dressed in some unique costume. Visitors from schools and towns all over the South were present at the party. Guests were present from colleges ranging from Smith College in Massachusetts to the University of Florida.

Robert M. Hitch, prominent business man of Savannah and a Mercer alumnus, will deliver the alumni address at the banquet of the Mercer Alumni Association, June 7, in the Daniel Marshall Dining Hall.

McAdoo to Speak

As has been announced before, William Gibbs McAdoo, Secretary of the Treasury of the United States in the Cabinet of Woodrow Wilson, will deliver the literary address to the graduating class Wednesday night, June 8, at the Municipal Auditorium.

The Board of Trustees of Mercer will hold their annual June meeting on Tuesday, June 7. The Alumni Association will also hold their business meeting on that day.

The baccalaureate address will be delivered by Dr. Rufus W. Weaver.

Dr. Freeman, who will preach the commencement sermon, is considered to be one of the foremost Baptist ministers of today. He is a graduate of McMaster University, and has written several books of sermons, as well as full length fiction.

He is now pastor of the First Baptist Church of Winnipeg. Previous to this he has held pastorates in London, England; Toronto, Canada; and Cleveland, Ohio. While in England he was professor of Homilies in Midland College, Nottingham, England.

He concluded with the wish and hope that Mercer would continue to grow and prosper.

Professor C. C. Sanders, teacher of evangelistic singing, then presented the chapel with a very beautiful piano which was purchased with the combined contributions of the ministerial students and the faculty.

Dr. Weaver made a very grateful speech of acceptance, receiving the chapel and the piano for the university. Another vocal selection was rendered by the quartet.

Dr. John A. Davidson, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Columbus, Ga. then gave a very splendid dedicatory sermon.
