In its first match of the season, the Mercer team went down before the superb playing of the Macon Racquet Club last Saturday afternoon. The Macon Racquet boasts one of the best teams in the South, the membership being composed almost entirely of former Mercer stars. In fact, each of the victors had formerly played on the Mercer team.

The match between the Mercer Tennis team and the team from the University of Georgia, which was proposed to be played last Tuesday in Macon, has been postponed, and Professor E. E. Folk states that he will wait until later on in the season before he sends his team, composed entirely of new men, up against the strong team which represents the University of Georgia.

Makes Clean Sweep

The Racquet Club made a clean sweep of the matches Saturday, winning two doubles and two singles, but two of the matches were very close, the Club being extended to its utmost to win. The closest match was the doubles affair between Cook and Silliman vs. Schofield and Sharp. The Mercer players came within two points of winning the contest on one occasion, but were defeated by the score: 3-6, 6-0, 6-3.

The singles match between Jimmie Glover, newcomer on the Mercer team, and Bob Bivins, Mercer singles champion of last year, proved to be a hard-fought affair. Glover showed much promise of becoming a future star and the veteran Bivins had to put forth his best efforts to win, 6-2, 6-8, 6-3.

Davis Beats Lewis

Ed Davis, Macon city champion for the last three years, defeated Logan Lewis, 6-0, 6-3, but at times during the second set Lewis showed good form and played the champion a close game. The other doubles match, played between the Heyward brothers, Andy and Emory, Georgia Inter-collegiate champions for the past two years, vs. Hank Stembbridge and Frank Jordan, was easily won by the former, 6-1, 6-2.

The match with Wake Forrest which was scheduled to be played here on April 30, has been postponed due to the fact that the date conflicts with the date set for the S. I. A. A. tournament to be held in Birmingham on April 28, 29, 30. The Wake Forrest team will probably be played at a later date.

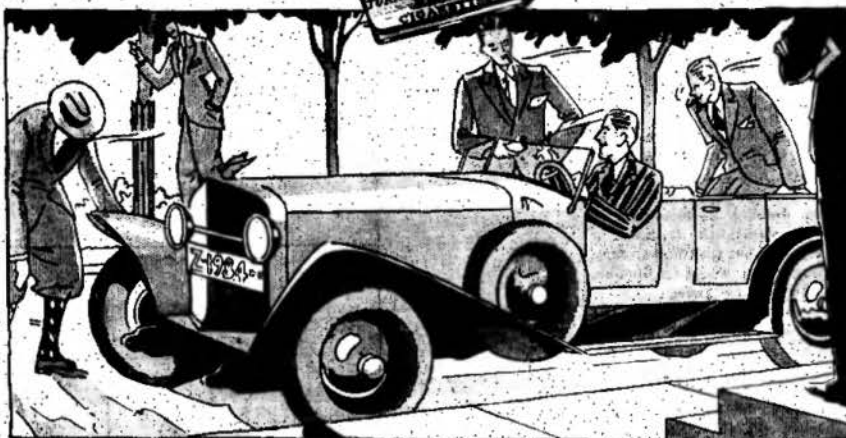
