It was his two base hit that won the first game for Mercer against Oglethorpe last Friday in the eleventh inning and in the following game he got three hits out of three times at bat.

**Strong Hitter**  
Last year he batted in cleanup position and chalked up an average of .370. This was not as good, however, as his average the year before, when he led his team in batting with .395.

Not only has Parks starred in his favorite sport, baseball, but also in football and basketball. He was captain of the recent Mercer football team that scored victories over Florida, Howard and Oglethorpe and was chosen all-S. I. A. A. end.

His strong fort was forward passes. It made little difference whether he was throwing or receiving them. Two years ago three passes that he received and ran for touchdowns helped very materially in Mercer's wins over Oglethorpe and Furman. His passes to Phoney Smith last season resulted in more than one touchdown and accounted for many yards gained.

**Also Good Basketball Player**  
Parks' record on three Mercer basketball teams is little if any less brilliant than in baseball and football. His first year he played substitute guard on the team that won the S. I. A. A. championship and was not beaten by a southern college team the entire season.

Last year he was a member of the team that won third place in the S. I. A. A. tournament and this year he was alternate captain on the team that was barely nosed out for first place honors by Citadel with a margin of one point in an extra five minute session.
