

NEW LAW CLINIC IS FORMED HERE

Lawyers of State May Send Here For Solution of Problems

A new honorary law organization, the "legal clinic staff," thought to be the only one of its nature in Georgia, has been formed at Mercer, according to Professor Joseph A. McClain, acting dean of the law school.

The purpose of the clinic is to encourage and promote efficiency among the law students and to give lawyers throughout the state expert legal aid free of charge. The organization is to begin functioning immediately.

Named By Faculty

The law dean has announced that the faculty of the law school each year will name the students, who by reason of their scholastic ability, merit membership on this staff.

At present the clinic is composed of ten leading students from the junior and senior classes. These are selected on the basis of their legal proficiency. To Add More

Prof. McClain announced that as soon as the fall term examinations are over, two or possibly three members of the first year law class will be added to the clinic staff.

The law students whose classroom work is of a high order and shows that they are competent to handle practical legal matters will be given opportunities in this organization to develop and put their classroom theories into actual practice. The students will gather material and make briefs on cases submitted to them by the lawyers. Then the completed briefs will be returned.

Given Publicity

The Macon newspapers recently published articles concerning Mercer's law clinic. In these articles, Georgia lawyers were urged to send their problems to the legal staff. The law department of the university is contemplating sending out letters at an early date inviting all the lawyers in the state to take advantage of this service.

This free service is not confined to legal problems that can be solved only by means of adequate library facilities, as the legal staff will be very glad to help in the solution of problems whose intricate nature makes it difficult for the lawyer to work out in his office. All this work by the legal clinic staff is under the strict supervision of the law faculty.

Professor McClain's announcement follows:

"The Mercer law school is equipped with a very complete law library which it feels should be made of service to the lawyers of the state. The local lawyers have been invited to make free use of this library, but the lawyers over the state, by reason of distance, are unable to frequent and use the library in the solution of their many legal problems. Therefore, the Mercer law school purposes to invite the lawyers over the state to send in questions of law which they are unable, by reason of limited facilities in library equipment, to completely exhaust the authorities upon. This legal clinic staff, composed of students reflecting qualities of high proficiency will undertake to take these questions and work up a complete brief thereon, which will be returned to the lawyer free of charge.

DR. WEAVER TO RETURN IN NOV.

Retiring Mercer Head Plans to Attend Grid Game Here

Although Dr. Rufus W. Weaver has gone to take up his duties in a new field, he announced before leaving that he will visit Mercer, the latter part of November, and will be here to witness one of the last football games of the season.

Dr. Weaver left Wednesday for Birmingham, where on Thursday, he took up his work as secretary of the education board of the Southern Baptist Convention, for which position he resigned as president of Mercer.

Will Travel

There will be one hundred and twelve denominational schools under Dr. Weaver's jurisdiction, all the Southern states included in the Southern Baptist Convention composing his field. His headquarters are in Birmingham, but the nature of his work will compel him to travel constantly.

Speaking his farewell words at Chapel Tuesday, and discussing Mercer's possibilities in the field of athletics, the retiring president said that the school has the greatest football team of all time, and he assured the team that he had confidence in them and expected them to be the champions of Georgia this year.

Wants Win Saturday

To win the game with Furman Saturday and to beat Georgia are the greatest issues facing Mercer this season, he stated.

Dr. Weaver emphasized the importance of a real school spirit and of every man doing his share by backing the team to the limit. "There has never been a great school nor a great football team without the full co-operation of every student, and there is no reason why Mercer should not have the greatest year in its history," he said in closing.
