

**"MERCER DAY" IS SET BY CORDELE**

**Coach Mosley, Butts, and Smith to Attend Special Event There.**

"Mercer Day" will be observed at the Baptist Church of Cordele, Ga., on November 13, if plans of the church officials are fulfilled. It was announced by Rev. Andrew Caraker, its pastor, who is a graduate of Mercer and a staunch supporter of the institution.

The information was given to a Cluster reporter in Cordele this week with the announcement that Coach Parker Mosley had been invited to be the main speaker for the occasion. He was requested to bring with him two of Mercer's football team, "Phoney" Smith and Wallace Butts were the Bears who were named by the Cordele people to be present at the event.

**Williams Invited**

Coach Mosley accepted the invitation extended him. J. K. Williams, Mercer's alumni secretary, has also been invited to attend the exercises in observance of Mercer Day, but Rev. Caraker had not been notified of his ability to be present.

Cordele people have been exceedingly interested in Mercer's football team this season, it was stated by Rev. Caraker, and a delegation of twenty-seven Cordele people motored here last Saturday for the Mercer-Furman game. They expressed regret at Mercer's loss, but added that they were not disappointed at the Bears in the least.

**"Phoney" Pleases**

To see "Phoney" Smith execute one dazzling run was sufficient return for their money, they stated, and they plan to be present in larger numbers.

"Bill" Bruner, a graduate of Mercer last June, is making a great success as teacher and coach at Cordele High School, citizens there said. Bruner's football team has won all of the three games which have been played thus far. He has taken an active part in the Baptist young people's work, Rev. Caraker stated.

The Hurricane reached higher proportions as the game progressed and the Bears were completely outplayed during the final half.

However, there was one Bear who was not outplayed, and though sick and hurt, he was not outfought. That was Phoney Smith, the South's greatest halfback. He played almost the entire game while in a semi-groggy condition, since nearly all the Hurricane's fury was directed toward him.

He got away for two long runs, each of which accounted for a Mercer touchdown. One of these was for 87 yards and was the best exhibition of broken field running seen on Alumni Field for some time. Smith was high point man for both teams, gaining 187 yards.

The Bears have no alibi to offer for their defeat. All members of the team are intent on redeeming themselves Saturday.

Dr. Ben C. Holtzclaw, dean of Mercer's graduate school, and Coach E. Parker Mosley returned Wednesday night from a two-day tour of South Georgia where they represented the university in the trip planned by the Macon Chamber of Commerce to advertise the city and its institutions.

Thirty-five Macon business men went on the "Good Will Tour" and visited fourteen towns on the 275-mile journey. They left Tuesday morning in two large Pierce line busses and were accompanied by the Central of Georgia band.

**Holtzclaw Speaks**

Luncheon was eaten at McRae, Ga., at noon Tuesday and Dr. Holtzclaw was selected to be the main speaker for the Macon group. At Abbeville, Coach Mosley was the speaker for the Maconites and afterward turned out to be the "shick" of the party as Abbeville's quota of beautiful girls crowded around him.

He was the out-standing singer of a quartet which was organized shortly after the tour began Tuesday morning. Among its personnel was another Mercer alumnus, W. A. Timmerman, and the two returned for the time being to the past when they were the song birds of Mercer's early glee club.

**Mosley Heard**

At Vienna, Coach Mosley was selected as the main speaker for the Macon tourists and again at Unadilla. During all of his talks, he lauded Mercer and invited the South Georgians to attend Mercer's athletic games. He was tendered a huge ovation at Vienna when he mentioned "Peggy" Campbell, all-American high school basketball player and member of Mercer's freshman class. Campbell is a native of Vienna.

The last stop on the trip was made at Perry and Dr. Holtzclaw was called upon to speak. A large assemblage of his home town citizens gathered to welcome the Macon delegation. A search for Coach Mosley was instigated in order to have him speak, also, but it was found that he had gone automobile riding with a crowd of Perry girls soon after arriving.

Other Mercer alumni who were on the trip were T. Baldwin Martin, Macon attorney, and Wilton Cobb, secretary of the Macon Chamber of Commerce. June Ellis acted as reporter for a local paper on the tour.
