Delta Theta Phi To Place Charter At Mercer

NATIONAL ORDER FAVORS PETITION OF LOCAL ADANO

All Members of the Old Chapter and Alumni Will be Initiated

FRAT OFFICERS TO COME

Installation Will be in December; Banquet is Planned at Hotel Dempsey

Delta Theta Phi, national law fraternity, will be installed at Mercer before the Christmas holidays, according to Carlton Mobley, president of the local which petitioned the national fraternity. The installation will take place about the tenth of December. The petition has been voted upon favorably by the national organization and several of the national officers will be present at the ceremony.

Began Last Spring

The new fraternity will be composed of the old members of the Adano fraternity. Last spring the organization decided to disband and become a local under the name of Theta Phi. It was under this name that Delta Theta Phi was petitioned. Adano was installed at Mercer in 1921, but was not recognized as a legal fraternity. This was the reason given for disbanding and re-naming Delta Theta Phi.

Ranks High

The new fraternity is a national organization and is recognized as being one of the three largest legal fraternities in America. There are at present fifty-nine active chapters with a membership of about two thousand. There are chapters at the Atlanta Law School, University of North Carolina, Chattanooga School of Law, University of Memphis, Law School, Vanderbilt University, University of Texas and almost every large college and university in the United States.

The national organization includes its membership many nationally known figures. Among them are such as: Edward D. White, former chief justice of the United States; Newton D. Baker, former secretary of war; W. T. Harding, ex-governor of Iowa and Honorable Elihu Root. The fraternity was founded in 1913 at Chicago.

Officers to Attend

At the installation in December, Ralph L. Adams, counselor of the fraternity and Ralph J. Winn, another national officer, will conduct the ceremonies. Mr. Mobley stated that the Atlanta Law School would attend the installation in a body. A banquet is to be given in honor of the new chapter. (Continued on Page 3)

Pennington will probably be the third man appointed on the board from the alumni to serve temporarily.

LOSER'S INJURY WEAKENS BEARS IN CLASSIC TILT

Revamped Mercer Backfield Will Face Georgia Eleven in Athens Saturday Afternoon

BULLDOGS UNDEFEATED

Georgia Has Record of Seven Wins For Season With Yale's Scapil Included

Minus their star quarterback a squad of twenty-three Mercer Bears will leave here early Saturday morning for Athens where Saturday afternoon they engage the bulldogs of the University of Georgia in the annual football game between the two institutions.

Loser is Lost

Buch Loser, quarterback and the nucleus around which Mercer's passing attack has been built, was left behind because of an abscess upon the bone of his leg. He was injured in last Friday's tilt with Oglethorpe, but it was not thought serious until Monday when an X-Ray examination showed that he would be out for the Georgia game and possibly not be able to play in the final game of the season with Wake Forest.

The Bears are determined to do what no other southern football team has done—score a touchdown on the Bulldogs. With Phoney Smith in the best condition of the season, Art Wright's broken hand well again, and the playing of Bill Alderman improving each game, Mercer fans are confident that such a determination can easily be realized.

Bulldogs Undefeated

In tackling the 1927 edition of the Georgia Bulldogs the Bears are playing the only major eleven in the entire country that has not met defeat this season. By the date the Bulldogs are the greatest team in the nation this year, since they defeated the powerful Yale team 14-6 in their second game of the season. They have also handily beaten Auburn, Furman, Florida, Virginia, and Clemson, scoring two touchdowns on each of the latter systems, and except Florida, whom they defeated 20-0.

Due to the injury to Buch Loser, the Bears will start the game without a back-up quarterback, and Art Wright, the living Yank, will start at quarter. Mercer will get its first run in the game with Phoney Smith, the star fullback, who has scored 10 touchdowns in 11 games. (Continued on Page 3)
