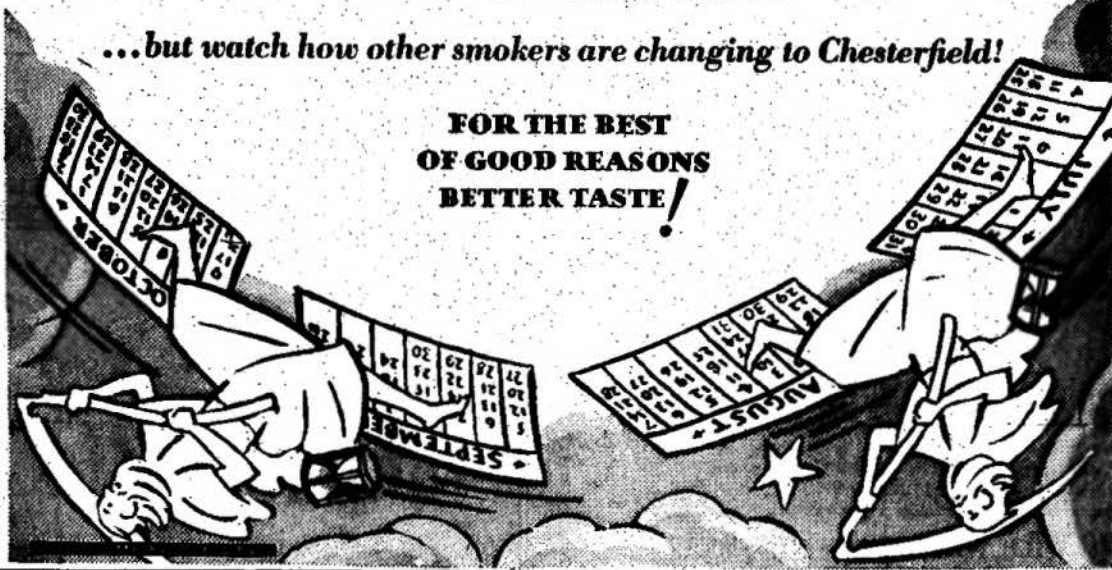

FRAT CONFERENCE PLANNED FOR N. Y.

Delegates From Practically Every College Fraternity Will Meet There Nov. 25-26

New York, November 17, 1927.—The Interfraternity Conference, annual gathering of delegates from practically every fraternity at American colleges and universities, will meet at the Hotel Pennsylvania here Nov. 25 and 26. More than 200 delegates, representing sixty different fraternities and coming from a hundred institutions of learning, will be present when the conference is called to order by Judge William H. Bayes, chairman of the interfraternity organization.

A number of college presidents and a score of deans and professors from all sections of the country will meet with the fraternity delegates for a mutual discussion of collegiate problems. Among the colleges to be represented will be Illinois, Yale, Cornell, Columbia, Penn. State, Rutgers, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, and many others.
