

## Literary Societies Meet In Annual Competition

The annual Society Day exercises of the Phi Delta and Ciceroonian literary societies were held Wednesday of this week. The society day program consisted of four orations, a basketball game, a debate. The university officials granted the student body a half holiday for the occasion.

The exercises began at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday morning when the faculty and student body gathered in the university chapel for the orations. Each society had two orators for the occasion from the senior class. Speaking for the Ciceroonian society were Fred K. Salter, Sandersville, who used as his subject, "A Decade of Reason," and John Gilbert, Brunswick, who spoke on "The Tides." Representing the Phi Delta Society were T. D. Cobb, Tifton, and Jeffrey Jones. Cobb spoke on "Twentieth Century Intolerance," while Jones had "Life's Sweetest Day

Dream," as his subject.

### Debate at Night

In the afternoon the annual basketball game between the two societies was played. The Ciceroonian team was coached by King Dixon, Savannah, while Reese Bowen managed the Phi Deltas.

The debate was held in the chapel building Wednesday night. Debating the question: Resolved, that Capital Punishment Should be Abolished, were Barnum Hawkes and Stanley Reese, Ciceroonians, who upheld the negative, while W. A. Womack and Wyche Fowler of the Phi Delta society argued for the affirmative. The judges were Dean Joe McClain, and Professors Paul Brosnan and W. C. Wright.

W. C. Reese, president of the Ciceroonian society, presided at both the oratorical exercises and at the debate. Jeffrey Jones of the Phi Delta society acted as secretary.

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
