**Liveliness. Not Jazzyness**

"By Liveliness, I did not think you meant jazzyness. I awarded second place to the juniors upon that basis, although it was a struggle between the freshman and the juniors. It strikes me that the freshman class has a great deal of talent. The freshmen overplayed their own class football team, but the editorial page was sprightly and lively. The juniors, on the other hand, had not only a good-looking and original paper, but also employed make-up to advantage. The juniors overplayed their 'beat' on the Dowell story. It was worth one line, but not two. Few stories ever are. Nevertheless, the juniors seem to have shaded the freshmen for second place.

"The sophomores made the same mistake of getting their vision out of focus with regard to their football team that the freshmen did. The color of their paper was such as to destroy typographical appearance. It was impossible to read the second age of the paper I had and the headlines failed to stand out at all."

**Second Decision**

"A second decision was: "As one of the judges in the Mercer Cluster edition contest, I give the sophomore edition first place, the senior edition second place and the junior edition, third. The sophomore and senior editions are unusually attractive and the front pages uniform and well balanced. All the editions are good, we might say very good. The junior class edition has more of appearance of a newspaper than any of the other editions, but its front page is not as attractive as the other, in my opinion. The freshman edition is very original in make-up and fairly well balanced.

"The editors of all four editions deserve highest praise as all of them made a splendid showing."

**Third Ranking**

The opinion of the other judge as he gave it is:

"In line with your request, I have gone over the four class issues and would rank them as follows:

"First, junior, because it is original enough (in college circles) to put out a real newspaper, and apparently every effort has been made to bring out a dignified issue.

"Lively stories have been developed in connection with Mercer, rather than forced through fake interviews, thus appealing to all readers rather than only to friends of the interviewers.

"Quality is shown in the high type of stories and in the way they are written, except for the editorial about Vienna which is too little to be considered in any worthwhile competition.

"Second, senior, for being nearest like the Junior.

"Third, freshman, because the color used is slightly more readable than that of the
