

CAULDRON PLANS ARE PROGRESSING

New and Interesting Features Will be Embodied in Year Book

Final plans for the 1928 Cauldron are nearing completion rapidly, and the Senior year book should be ready to go to press within the next few days, Tom Cobb, editor, and John Gilbert, business manager, announced this week.

Roy Hickman, representative of the Alabama Engraving Company, and R. D. Crocker, of the Benson Printing Company, were in Macon last week for a conference with the heads of the Cauldron, and every section of the book was mapped out in detail, ready for the press when the staff completes its work.

Theme Decided Upon

Although it has not been publicly announced, and probably will not be known until the Cauldron is issued, the editor said that the theme has been decided upon, and the efforts of the staff will be directed toward the completing of present plans.

Many new and interesting features have been added to the contents of the book this year, it has been explained, and it is expected that the 1928 year book will be the best ever to represent a senior class at Mercer.

"Phoney" is Feature

Probably the most unusual feature of the Cauldron is its waiving of all precedent in its dedicating the book to Joseph Farrar "Phoney" Smith, Mercer's brilliant athlete. Coming as it does in Phoney's senior year, the dedication climaxes a career of four sensational years.
