## MERCER CAMPUS BEING IMPROVED

Banks and Lawns on Campus Being Resodded and Street Widened

Extensive improvements of the Mercer campus and environs are being made. The city of Macon is having the work done to compensate for the strip of property which it is using in widening Coleman Avenue.

Coleman avenue, the street in front of the university, is being widened ten feet from College street to Lynden Ave. The strip is being taken off the side belonging to the university. The bank along the street will be resodded and a five-foot sidewalk will replace the one which has been taken up.

### Site for Station

Montpelier Avenue will be extended to Coleman Avenue instead of terminating at Lynden Avenue, as it now does. The new street is being cut through a strip of the campus, and will leave a triangular lot bounded by Montpelier, Lynden and Coleman Avenues, directly in front of Tattnell Square Pharmacy. The lot, which is a site for a gasoline filling station, will be sold for that purpose. Proceeds realized from the sale are to be used as a building fund for the new law building to be erected.

The road running through the campus from College Street to Adams Street has also undergone repairs. Banks, lawns, and other parts of the campus void of vegetation are being plowed or dug up and sodded. The bank in front of Cynthia Holiday Hall is to be improved by being built up, shaped and sodded.

## MERCER DEBATES PETRELS IN APRIL

Mercer Team Has Won Debates From Wofford and Furman This Season

Mercer, represented by Roy Hale and Sam Overstreet, meets Oglethorpe University in Atlanta, April 6, in the next and third intercollegiate debate of the year.

The Mercer debaters will argue the negative side of the question, "Resolved that the direct primary election for state and national offices should be abandoned."

A team of Mercer debaters, Tom Cobb and W. E. Smith, have returned from a successful tour through the Carolinas.

On March 1 they defeated Wofford College at Spartanburg. On the following night Furman University was defeated in Greenville, S. C. In both debates the Mercer men upheld the negative side of the question, "Resolved that the U. S. should cease to protect by armed force capital invested in foreign lands, except after formal declaration of war." The score was two to one in both instances.

The present schedule, according to Prof. H. L. Fowler, debate coach, calls for only one more varsity engagement and that with Auburn. Florida was to have debated Mercer in Macon but the Alligator institution cancelled the engagement. There will be no home debates for Mercer this season.

A debate between freshmen representatives of Mercer and Emory university is being planned. If present plans materialize, according to Prof. Fowler, this debate probably will take place near the end of the school year.

## ENROLLMENT HITS 500 MARK TUESDAY

Several New Co-Eds Register Here; Registration Yet Unfinished

Registration figures Tuesday afternoon showed that the number of students who had matriculated exceeded the 500 mark. The 502 who had registered does not include students of the night school, the law school, the summer school, and those taking extension work.

Matriculation had not been completed as late as Tuesday—as was indicated by the number of late arrivals who crowded the registrar's office. When the registration is completed, it is expected that the number will approach that of last term. This number, excluding the law students, was 679.

As is customary, a number of students were graduated in the winter term. To offset the loss, eight new students have registered, in addition to a number who had attended the university before. Several new co-eds are among the number.

## ANNUAL INCLUDES SPECIAL SECTIONS

Student Life and Sponsor Sections New Features of Caudron

Eight sections are to comprise this year's Caudron according to Tom Cobb, editor, and John Gilbert, business manager. These are to be the university section, with the faculty members, the class section, including all scholastic classes, the athletic, fraternity, sponsor, hilarity, student life, and the advertisement sections.

### Work Completed

Final work for the publishing of the 1926 Senior year book has been completed, and the material was sent to the printers this week. It is expected to be ready for distribution about the first of fifteenth of May, it was announced. All students who have not received their annuals are urged to see the editor or business manager as early as possible, for they have ordered only the number for which they now have orders, with a few extra copies. Twenty-five "volumes de luxe" are to be printed for those who desire them in gifts. These are bound in white leather, and are to be offered at a special price, just a little above that of the regular Caudron.

### Two New Features

Two of the features of this year's book are the student life and the sponsors' pictures are to be presented in a pleasing green ink, and will be published as single-paged oval "cuts." The student life section has not been attempted in three or four years, and the editors announce that this will be one of the most interesting divisions of the book.

"We are very optimistic over the 1926 publication," said the business manager, "and we have tried to make this book the best that has been produced at Mercer. We want it to be a representative book for the year 1926, and we would like for as many students who will to get one."
