CLUSTER PLAN IS OFFERED SCRIBES

Three Juniors in Charge, Suggested by Editor in Tendering Resignation

The practicability of The Cluster appearing during the remainder of the year under the direction of three Juniors to be nominated by The Cluster staff and voted upon by the student body was suggested at a meeting of The Cluster staff held Tuesday night when June Ellis, Macon, tendered his resignation as editor. Difficulty in pleasing the censors of The Cluster was given as the reason for the move.

To Write Willet

The staff members voted unanimously not to accept the resignation and plans were made to communicate with Hugh M. Willet, president of the Mercer Board of Trustees and head of the Alumni association, in order to ascertain the status of The Cluster. The staff decided to meet again Monday night to act on the reply.

Ellis indicated that he wished to remain on the staff as a reporter. In tendering his resignation, he made the following statement for publication:

"It is with sincere regret that I turn the pages of The Cluster over to other hands, but certain factors have necessitated the move. To the student body, I wish to express my gratitude for the editorship which was tendered me. The success of The Cluster this year is due to the efficiency of its staff members and not to efforts of the editor. To the editorial, business and circulation departments of the paper, I express thanks for the hearty cooperation which was given me. In return, I have given my best and no thanks are due me for it has been a source of pleasure to work with the publication. It is my belief that The Cluster can carry on for the remainder of the year, the work towards the goal which it set last September."

"JUNE ELLIS."

The letter written to Hugh M. Willet, chairman of the Mercer university board of trustees by the Mercer Cluster staff members on the resignation of June J. Ellis, of Macon, editor of the paper, was submitted to Dr. A. P. Montague, acting president of the university, Wednesday morning. The committee from the staff, composed of Courtland Gilbert, of Brunswick, and Jimmie Sharps, of Macon, wrote the letter at the request of the members of the editorial body.

At the meeting it was explained to Dr. Montague that the Cluster's action is not an attack upon the faculty or administration of Mercer, it was announced but for the purpose of affecting changes in existing conditions. At present, it was explained, the faculty adviser is called before the president and the president must answer to the trustees for any article printed in the paper that is not deemed suitable. The Cluster members asked that this be changed so that they may print what they wish and be held responsible for it themselves.
