...of church history in the theological department, it was said.
In the law school, the dean, Prof. Joe A. McClain, was the only one re-elected at the meeting of the trustees, but that does not mean that the full faculty will not be retained.

Status is Same
Contrary to the general impression given out in various reports, the various schools of the university are not to be reduced to departments, according to Dr. Dowell, but remain in their present status.

"The organization of the university was continued on the present basis with one or two exceptions and with the following divisions," a statement issued after the meeting of the board read. The divisions referred to are the college of liberal arts, the school of Christianity, the school of education, the school of law, and the school of commerce.

The school of journalism is to come under the supervision of the English department, in the school of liberal arts, a dean for which is to be chosen. Professor E. E. Folk was re-elected head of the department of journalism.

Leaves Not Granted
Professor Folk of the journalism school, and Professor Paul Brosman, of the law school asked for leaves of absence, but were refused by the board. It has not been learned whether the two professors will remain on the faculty for another year.

There were no elections in the athletic department, it was stated, the matter of selecting the athletic board being left to Dr. Dowell, who will return here for another meeting of the board on Monday of commencement week. At the same time Dr. Dowell will make recommendations for the filling of the positions that have not been filled up to this time.

Appropriate resolutions were adopted and copies will be furnished each of the removed members of the faculty. Dr. Dowell stated, Dr. White offered the following resolution at the meeting of the board on the splendid work done by Mr. Garrett:

"Resolved that the trustees herewith express their appreciation of the splendid work that you have done at Mercer and their regret that in the necessities of our budget, and in the readjustment of the organization found it unavoidable that they were unable to retain your services in the institution and that they extend to you their sincere good will and hope for your success and happiness."

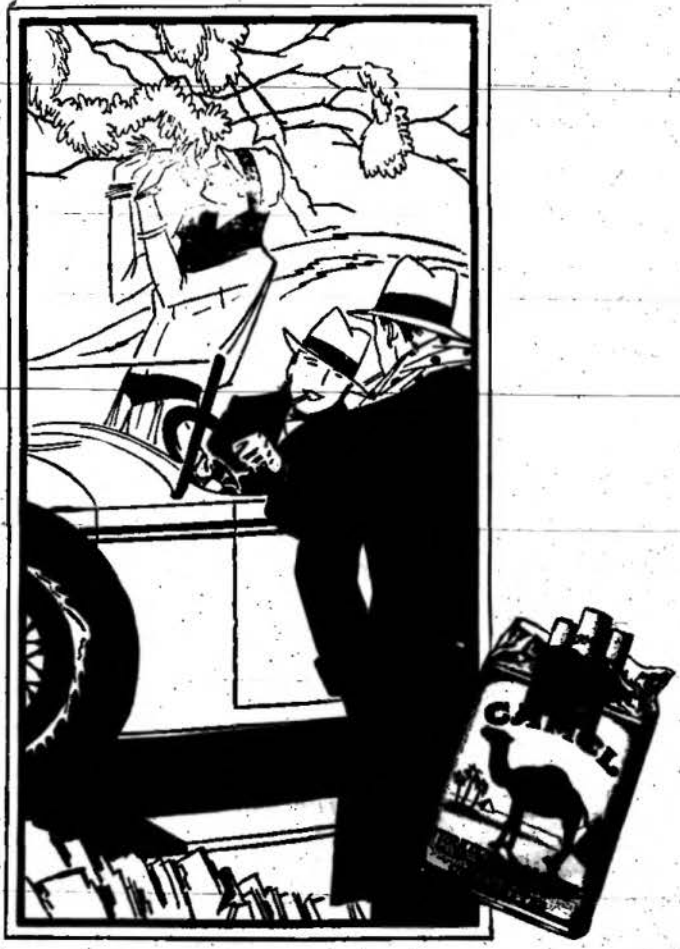
