room for doubt. Professor Carver instructs the students to catch only alley cats, but these are just the kind they cannot catch. The alley cats never come within reach of the nets used to capture members of the feline family.

Ten Cents a Cat

Ten or fifteen cents, however, is enough to induce nearly any negro boy to produce a cat in four minutes. Often, however, a lady or gentleman cat is missed from somebody's home just after the negro boy delivers his capture.

Levant Carter estimates that nine cents is the average amount paid for cats. This year, he said, the market is higher, and the price per cat is averaging 11 cents.

Look Out, Boobey?

"Each year," Carter stated, "the supply in the vicinity of Mercer apparently diminishes. The market price of cats may be expected to rise correspondingly."
