

TEACHING SCHOOL STAFF ENLARGED

Two Buildings Needed to House Department of Primary Education

The department of elementary education of Mercer summer school has been enlarged until two buildings will be necessary this summer to house classes in that branch of learning alone. Primary education classes will occupy the Theological building and a structure formerly used by the School of Commerce.

Miss Minnie Swindells, of Dallas, Texas, will have general supervision of the primary education department, and eight teachers have agreed to give course in that branch of the summer school.

Faculty Listed

Miss Virginia Washington Stith, of the survey staff of experimental schools for childhood, of New York City, who is to teach primary education; Miss Elizabeth Donovan, of Wadley, blackboard drawing; Miss Sallie Moll Duggan, of the state department of education, tests and measurements; Miss Cora McFarland, of Dallas, Texas, special methods in the social sciences; Miss Margaret Coble, of Columbia, S. C., arithmetic and English methods; Miss Lillian Mitchell, of Canton, penmanship; and Miss Erma Nala Voss, of Wichita Falls, Texas, public school music.

Qualified to Teach

All of these are eminently qualified to teach education, according to Dean Peyton Jacob, director of summer school. Miss Stith was on the faculty of the West Tennessee State Teachers' college for two years. Miss Swindells has been teaching at Mercer in the summer since 1923. Miss Duggan is a specialist in tests and measurements. Miss Voss is president of the state federation of music clubs, of Texas, and is head of the department of music in the public schools of Wichita Falls.

Courses in academic and commercial subjects also will be taught. Dr. Spright Duwell, president-elect of Mercer, will head the administrative board.

The Law school will be operated this year for the first time in the summer. Courses will be offered by Professors Paul W. Brosnan, J. A. McClain, Jr., and F. A. Wright. Dates for summer school, for all departments, have been set for June 12 to August 21. There will be two terms, the first ending July 17.

DEBATERS DEFEAT OGLETHORPE TEAM

Hale and Overstreet Uphold Record of Undeclared Forensic Contests

Mercer continued her march to a perfect year in the forensic field by defeating Oglethorpe with a unanimous decision of the judges Friday night in Atlanta. Roy Hale and Sam Overstreet represented Mercer in debating the negative side of the question "Resolved, that Direct Primary Elections for State and National Offices Should be Abandoned."
