STUDENT LEADERS ELECTION CLOSING TOMORROW AT 12

The ballot box in the co-op will be open for the reception of votes for the ten outstanding men in each of the classes until noon Saturday, according to Will Ed Smith, editor of the Cauldron, which is sponsoring the selection of the leaders from each of the classes.

Mr. Smith said that the members of the Cauldron staff think that the new method devised will be much fairer to the students than for the staff of the publication to select the men. The editor urged each member of the student body to vote for men in his class.

Each ballot is to contain the names of ten members of the class in which the voter is enrolled, according to Mr. Smith, and the ballots will not be counted unless signed by the voter.

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"Just the impetuosity of youth makes it necessary for the faculty to supervise," Mr. Cork declared. "The paper needs the superior wisdom and wider experience of the faculty to tone it down," he said.

Should Voice Opinions
On the other hand, the negative maintained that if The Cluster was censored, it would cease to be voicing student opinion and would become a publication of the facts issued by the administration. Censorship would not permit the Cluster to be published by the students, Mr. Gilbert said, for it would cramp the style and ideas of the students. Mr. Smith, his colleague, contended that published criticism on campus conditions had proved effective. He denied the affirmative's statement that results could be obtained through arbitration. Mr. Smith held that the administration existed for the students and not the students for the administration.

Incidents were cited by the negative in which the policy of unrestricted criticism of the past had resulted in increased respect for the university from other schools. "If you are going to censor The Cluster, why not censor the students as well?" asked one of the negative speakers, "for the students take home as many facts as are printed."

"It is not the social, political, or religious policy of The Cluster which the administration censors," Mr. Gilbert said. It is those articles which contain in them facts which the administration wishes to hide—facts which the administration fears to have made public."

Lawyers May Receive Degrees Before June

The executive committee of the university in its last regular meeting decided that hereafter upon application by the various members of the senior class those who desire their diplomas before graduation may receive them by special action, it was learned this week.

This action was taken for the benefit of those embryo lawyers who graduate at other times than the regular commencement, it was said. The state of Georgia requires that to practice law within its confines a person must either pass the bar examination or else be graduated from some approved law school.

This has forced a number of men from the law school here in the last few years to wait until the regular graduation before practicing law in the state. The action will also take effect in the school of education where a person in order to teach must have a diploma from some recognized school.

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Efforts Being Made For Phi Beta Kappa

Efforts are being made by the administration of Mercer university to secure a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, the oldest honorary fraternity in the world, and of Omicron Delta Kappa, a fraternity for leaders on the campus. There is an urgent need here for both, said J. C. Shelburne, registrar, in explaining the plans to a

Cluster representative.
In order to get a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, it would be necessary to form a club of students eligible for membership in the fraternity, and after three years of organization petition for a charter. Phi Beta Kappa selects members only on scholastic record, and the national convention meets every three years.
The administration also is working for a revision of the present pledging rules of the fraternities, Mr. Shelburne stated.

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
