"Peggy" alone accounted for 13 points and his all 'round playing showed that he is of all-American caliber. Wright, in addition to his excellent guarding managed to score 9 points, while Carpenter showed that he had lost none of his old kneck of leaping high into the air and getting the ball off the backboard.
