EDUCATION CLUB HEARS McCLAIN

Dean Joe A. McClain of the law school spoke to the members of the education club at their first regular meeting this term last Tuesday night at 7:30. He spoke about the philosophy of the prospective teacher, his field, the present conditions in the profession and the outlook for the future. He stated that the greatest return that any man can get in the profession of teaching is the knowledge that he is shaping the destiny of the future champions of society, and that the next greatest return is that those who become teachers are permitted by the very nature of their profession to better stay in touch with the world of literature and art and are less likely to degenerate to that point at which they have little other interest than the day's work and the day's newspaper.
