clapsed, and then only upon a favorable vote of two-thirds of the parties of the agreement.

Second, the offending fraternity may be prohibited from bidding any first year man whatever, until such time as the committee may determine subsequent to 1 o'clock p. m. of the third Sunday after the first registration day of the winter quarter and before the bidding day of the following year.

Third, the offending fraternity may be prohibited, either permanently or for a specified period, from bidding any First Year Man whom the committee may deem to have influenced by a breach of the agreements.

4. We agree that any decision of the governing committee regarding the merits of an alleged breach, or the penalty imposed therefor, may be set aside by a four-fifths vote of the representatives of members of the agreement.

Publicity for Breaches.

10. We agree that in the event of an established breach of this agreement it shall be the duty of the governing committee to give the facts of the wildest possible local publicity.

11. We agree that unless a fraternity in this agreement shall withdraw its signature before April first of any year, it shall thereby automatically subscribe to the agreement for the

following year. Any fraternity which intends to withdraw may do so only by notifying the chairman of the governing committee in writing of such intention, between March first and March fifteenth. In the event of such notice being the chairman shall at once call a meeting of the representatives of all fraternities members of the agreement and make known to matter shall then be discussed and any them the notice of withdrawal. The other fraternity or fraternities may withdraw from the agreement at a meeting to be called a week later.

12. All fraternities having men pledged, who on the date of the acceptance of this agreement, are not bona fide students of the university will hand to the secretary of the Pan Hellenic council a typewritten list of
