Blue Key Fraternity Hears Three Speakers

Dr. Spright Dowell, Prof. E. T. Holmes, and Mr. T. S. Lowry, were the principal speakers at a meeting of the Blue Key fraternity which was held in the Tip Top tea room Monday night. After a short business session, brief addresses were made by these men, who praised the purpose of the organization, stating that the group has great influence in "creating the proper spirit among other members of the Mercer student body."

The fraternity voted to sponsor a basketball game in the near future between the Mercer Bears and any other available opponent. The proceeds from the game were to be given to Dr. Dowell "to expend as he sees fit for the advertisement of the university." A committee, composed of R. B. Gilbert, Luke Hill, and J. H. Hill, Jr., was appointed by President Will Ed Smith to confer with Mercer officials concerning the game.

It was announced yesterday by R. B. Gilbert, chairman of the committee, that athletic authorities have informed him that it would be impossible to stage the game before the S. I. A. A. tournament, since there are no dates open between now and the time the Bears leave for Jackson. "It is probable that a post-season game will be arranged and played after the Bruins return from the tournament", Chairman Gilbert stated.
