It was soon after the Panther center and forward left the game that the score was tied at 33-all, with eight minutes to go. Neipp, Panther captain, put Southern back in the lead with a pair of foul goals, and his team led from then on, although the Bears staged a thrilling rally in the closing minutes of the game.

Trailing by ten points with only two minutes to go, the Bears staged their rally, which netted them seven points with Wright and Mallard leading, Mallard tossing the goal that made the score 45-41 just before the final whistle.
