

### BEAR TRACK MEN PRIME FOR MEET

Candidates Enter Second Week of Training Under Supervision of J. D. Sewell

The second week of training for Mercer's annual track meet began Monday afternoon when 34 candidates reported to supervisor J. D. Sewell and were put through a strenuous workout. If the games are held Friday, April 12, as they are now tentatively scheduled, it means that there is a possibility of only eight or nine training days before the contest. Realizing this, Sewell is losing no time in whipping the men into condition.

Because of a conflict with the Tech relays which are to be held Saturday, April 13, the date for the meet may have to be moved up a day or two, according to chairman Sewell. If this is necessary the practice sessions will have to be still more intensive.

**Men Appointed**  
Class representatives have been appointed by Sewell to take charge of the candidates from each class. These representatives must hand in to him not later than Monday, April 8 (moved up from Wednesday, April 10) a list of men entering the various events from the class which they represent. Frank McWilliams is the senior chairman, while Tom Boyd and Hill Coker are to represent the junior and sophomore classes respectively. A freshman leader will be appointed later in the week, Sewell announced.

Harvey Stipe and George Potts are practicing weight throwing daily, and are consistently tossing the discus around 120 feet per heave. The most promising sprinters are J. E. Rudasill, Frank Paulk, Fred Caron, J. D. Sewell, Tom Boyd, Clyde Carpenter, Hill Coker, and Chris CoCroft. Other candidates for the longer runs are James Rutland, James O'Neal, Harold Muecke, Charles Cox, Hugh Dosier, Wilbur Smith and Miles.

A few of the candidates have been timed on their runs. 10 4-5 seconds for the hundred yard dash, 56 flat for the 440, and 23 1-5 for the 220 yard dash, are among the best times clocked up to this period of training.

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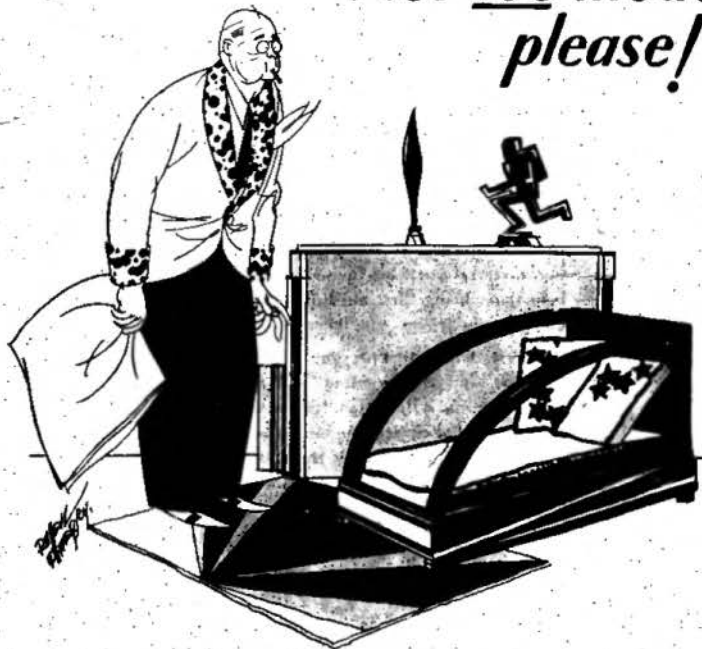
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
