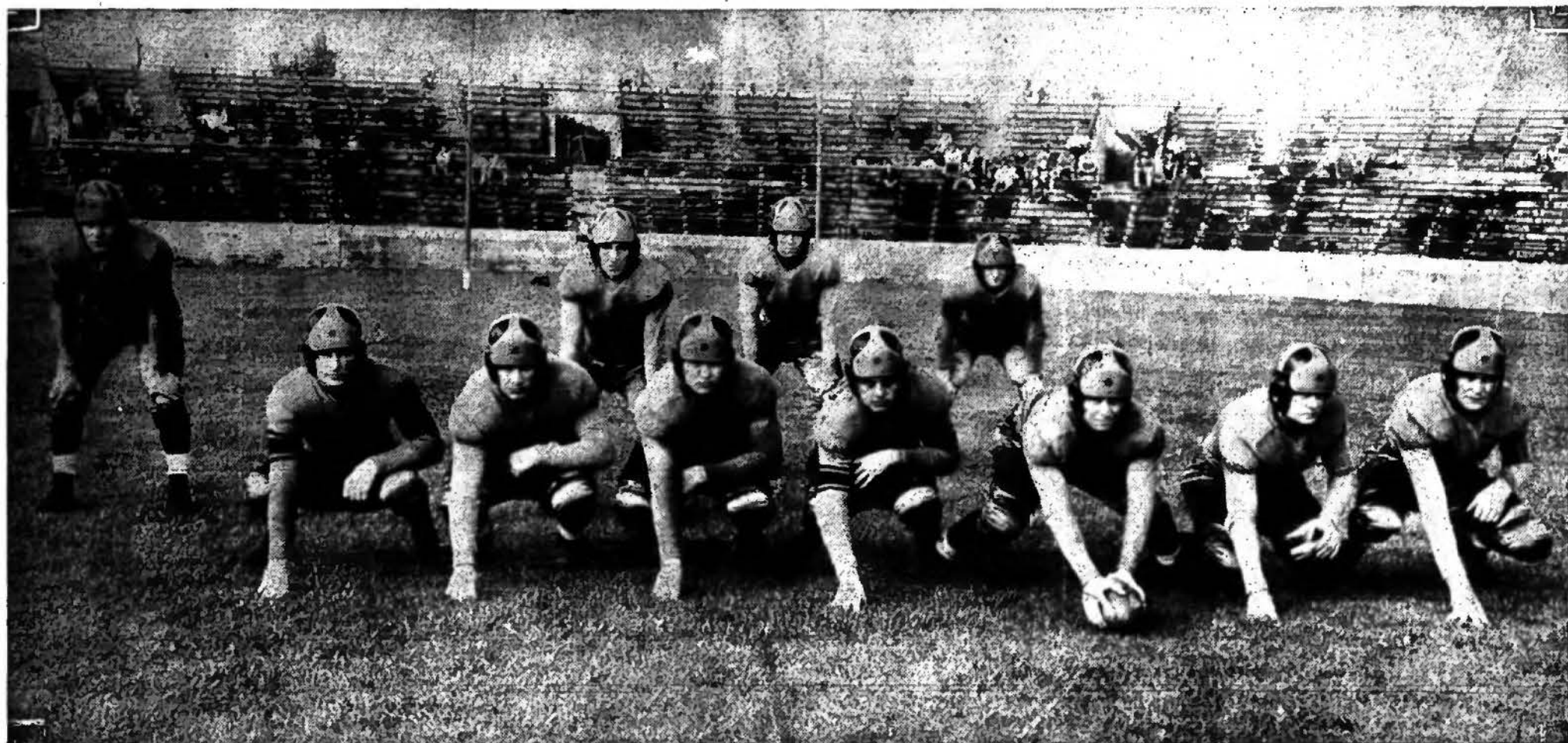


# IT'S BEARS VS BULLDOGS AT CENTENNIAL STADIUM TODAY

## BIRMINGHAM TEAM FIGHTS BEARS TO A SCORELESS TIE

### Alabama Squad Shows Unexpected Stubbornness to Crippled Mercerians

Birmingham, Oct. 14.—(Special to Cluster)—Taking advantage of all the breaks, a desperate Birmingham-Southern Panther held the Mercer Bear to a 0-0 score at Legion field Saturday. Time and again the aggressive Bears drove down in the shadow of the Panther goal, only to lose the ball on fumbles or intercepted passes.

The Bears received a break early in the game when McKay fumbled Porter's kick on Southern's 25 yard line. Bowie Gray recovered. On the first play, Trommerhauser caught the Panthers flatfooted, and hurled a pass to Allen, which was good for 14 yards. After two tries at the line, Mercer went to the air again, but this time Young intercepted Trommerhauser's pass and raced back up the field for 34 yards.

The next break was in Southern's favor. Zinkowsky fumbled a punt on his 24 yard line which was recovered by Southern. A first down was made in two plays, but the Bear line held in the shadow of the goal, and Davis tried a field goal from the 20 yard line but it fell short. This constituted Southern's scoring efforts for the day, as the Bear line was invincible for the rest of the game.

Mercer almost scored just before the half ended, when they marched deep into Southern territory on passes, but again the Bear attack faltered, and the half ended with the score at 0-0.

All during the second half the Bears kept knocking at the door of Southern's goal. A fumble by Porter on the 11-yard line, hurt one chance, and penalties inflicted on the Bears ruined several others. Late in the game the Bears started a determined attack, and three passes from Trommerhauser to Allen and Popeko carried the ball from Mercer's 22 yard line to the Panthers 27. The game ended here with a pass from Trommerhauser to McQuaig incomplete.

There was no doubt as to the superiority of the Bruins. They made 12 first downs to Southern's 7, and gained nearly 4 times as much yardage, but credit must be given to the stalwart defense of

the Panther's line when danger threatened.

For the Bears, the luminaries were that big orange-jersied line, which held Southern to one earned first down. They repeatedly hurled the Southern backs for losses. In the backfield, Trommerhauser's passing and the running of Ernie Zinkowsky were the bright features. Bob Lee made several nice gains before he was injured, and also was on the receiving end of five of Trommerhauser's passes.

The cadet eleven, which showed a great knowledge of the fundamentals of the game, blocked and tackled with a vim, and this was really the deciding factor in the play of the two teams. And another strong factor was the playing of Hartman, a hard-running Cadet back. He scored two touchdowns against the freshmen, one on a 65 yard run after intercepting one of Mercer's passes. He also scored another on a short run.

With the score 18-0 against them, the Baby Bruins finally scored in the waning moments of the game. A pass from Bloodworth to McKenzie turned the

trick. Long spiralling kicks from the toe of this same Bloodworth kept the Bruins out of trouble during the greater part of the game.

## SUGGESTS COLLEGE DEGREE OF MASTER CITIZEN

Oxford, O.—(IP)—A college degree of M. C. (Master Citizen) for young college alumni who make good in public life was suggested by President Alfred H. Upham of Miami University in his opening address to Miami students, an address in which he deplored the lack of intellectual living on the part of college graduates.

"Through all this seething criticism directed toward higher education," Dr. Upham said, "there runs an unpleasant thought which must come to all of us. Are we sending out into life young men and women who use their brains in matters of public concern?"

"To my mind the gravest reflection on our American education is the pitifully small number of our graduates who continue to lead anything like an intellectual life. I am not asking for prigs nor high-brows, but merely for people who read good books and enjoy them, who have opinions of their own which go deeper than newspaper

headlines, who take a responsibility for the welfare of their community and state which goes further than crabbng about the baseball team and taxes."

The Miami president asserted that the curricula of American colleges needed a thorough overhauling.

Miami this year opens its 125th year as an institution of higher learning.

New York—(IP)—New York University last week came into possession of its first diploma, issued 100 years ago to James Josephum Acheson.

The faded parchment was obtained from Russel A. Chapin of Santa Monica, Cal., a grandson of the first graduate.

When Acheson was a student at the University the professor of painting and sculpture was Samuel F. B. Morse, later the inventor of telegraphy.

Acheson later became a prominent doctor in New York and Brooklyn.
