FRIDAY'S FOES PLAYED FIRST COLLEGE GAME IN STATE AT ATHENS

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forming a football team seriously, for this sentence appears in the news of the club: "The football, which was ordered some time ago, has arrived and playing will begin immediately much to the delight of the whole club."

The boys ordered uniforms three weeks before the game with Georgia. Interest ran high because this was to be the first contest of any kind that Mercer had waged with another college. The uniforms consisted of a white canvas jacket, white canvas knee pants, black stockings and a cap made of the college colors. (Orange and Black, adopted 1892).

Prior to the Georgia game, the Mercer club put on an exhibition game in the park "In order to show the people of Macon what a game of football is." Their attempts must have met with success, for about 175 Macon people went with the team to Athens.

The Telegraph for Sunday, Jan. 31, carried the head "IT WAS FIFTY TO NOTHING." The two teams appeared on the field at 3:30. The lineup was as follows:

Georgia back, began to romp over Mercer. The crowd was so excited over his first touchdown that they covered the field and had to be removed before the game could be continued.

The first half was a record of as many touchdowns as Georgia could pile up in 45 minutes. The score at the half was Georgia 28, Mercer 0. After a long rest of five minutes, the boys were at it again, or more properly, Georgia began scoring more touchdowns. The account has it "Herty and Kimball each made a touchdown after a hard fight," then Herty got in another touchdown "by a magnificent run, dodging his opponents after his blockers had been left, broke through the excited crowd, ran under a flight of steps and scored with a Mercer man right at his heels."

"It was good work all around."

The game ended after Shackleford ran to Mercer's goal without much opposition, and Herty, termed "the immortal," also made a fine run for another touchdown. Final score, Georgia 59, Mercer 0.

On February 7, an account appeared which sets the Mercer team in a more favorable light, depicting the beginning of the Mercer Spirit. "Since the awful defeat in football which the Mercer boys recent-

ly suffered at the hands of the Athens fellows, they have become even more enthusiastic with athletic sports." The boys went to work in earnest and agreed that the Athens fellows were as fine a set as could be found anywhere.

These were the beginning. Mercer played two more games that spring, winning one and losing the other. The Mercer football team was a little of the modern team, but it was the beginning.
