The Georgia scores came as the result of two long runs. The first came in the third quarter, when Grant got away on a 44 yard sprint for the first marker. The second tally came in the last

quarter as Sam Brown, Homer Key and Buck Chapman worked together to get the ball down the field and across the final strips. The extra point failed.

With Zinkowsky and Trommerhauser out of the play, but with the line running with machinelike smoothness, a second string backfield, led by Henry Allen, marched down the field for 64 yards to score the second Bear touchdown.

A pass, Allen to McQualg, went astray, and with it the chance to tie the score.

Red Camp and Swede Olsson, Mercer tackles, added to their prestige with their matchless play at

their positions. Time after time the Bulldog plays would be nipped in the bud by these tackles, who would break through to stop Georgia plays before they could get started.
