the ball to Chattanooga. Another threat was ended when the timer's gun ended the first half.
The Bears came back after the half and drove deep into the enemy's territory, but as before, the offense bogged down when a score was needed. At the beginning of the fourth quarter, Jake Trommerhauser, veteran quarterback who was held out of the game on account of injuries, was rushed into the fray, and business picked up. Allen returned a punt to Chattanooga's 18-yard line, and he and McQuaig made it first down on the nine. Trommerhauser, in three plunges, took it to the one-yard line and McQuaig dashed through for the touchdown. Gray place-kicked the extra point.
Soon afterwards the Bears were back again as a result of Trommerhauser's jaunt for 20 yards over tackle. But an intercepted pass on the 4-yard line halted that. The timer's gun ended the game with the ball on the 'Nooga 4-yard line, and another touchdown imminent.
The Moccasins never had a chance. That huge Bear line, with Olssen, Camp, Harrison, Reddick leading the attack, completely

smothered every offensive effort, and Chattanooga showed a net gain of only 10 yards at the end of the game. The Mercer offense, led by Allen and Lee, rolled up 357 yards, and gained ground at will through the holes opened up by the Bear linesmen. Numerous Mercer substitutes carried on just as well as their predecessors.
