Spring Holidays To Begin Thursday, March 11, Registrar Announces

### EXAMS TO END WED.

Payment Of Fees Must Be By Wednesday, Business Office Says

Examinations for the winter quarter will begin Monday March 5, and end the following Wednesday, when spring holidays start, it was announced by J. C. Shelburne, registrar.

Freshmen began registration for the spring quarter yesterday, and sophomores will register today, according to a bulletin prepared by the university. Hours for registration have been set at from 8:30 until 10:30 A. M., and from 1:00 to 5:30 P. M., today.

Juniors will report to the Registrar's office Monday, March 5. The hours will be from 9:00-12:00 A. M., and from 2:00-5:00 P. M. Seniors and graduate students will register Tuesday.

Spring holidays officially begin Thursday, March 8, and classes will be resumed Monday, March 12. Fees for the winter quarter must be paid on or before Wednesday, March 7, the business office has announced.

## DEBATING GROUPS RETURN TO CAMPUS

Both Varsity And Freshmen Have Successful Trip

The varsity and freshman debating teams returned to Macon last Saturday after a successful trip on which they encountered debating teams of Emory, Georgia Tech, Oglethorpe, Howard, Auburn, and the University System Evening School. The varsity team was composed of A. J. Land and Brainard Curry, and the freshman team was composed of John B. Clark, Jr., and Jack Gautier.

On Monday night, February 19, the varsity team won a 2-1 decision over Oglethorpe in Atlanta. On February 23, the freshman team lost to Oglethorpe freshmen in an audience decision. The contests with Emory, Howard, Georgia Tech, and the University System Evening School were non-decision debates.

The freshman team argued with Oglethorpe and the University System Evening School on the subject: "Resolved, That the British Cabinet Form of Government Should be Adopted by the United States." ## MEETING WITH KING TOLD BY FERGUSON

Mercer Professor Tells Of First Meeting With Former King Albert

In his weekly column "Looking Outwards," Major K. B. Ferguson revealed some interesting facts about a meeting that he once had with the late King Albert of Belgium, whose recent tragic death shocked the world.

Major says: "A few days after the outbreak of war, I was sent as assistant staff officer to a British colonel on liaison duty at Belgium headquarter. A day or two after my arrival there, I was sitting talking to a group of Belgium officers when my colonel called me upstairs. He was a man of very few words, and I had scarcely grasped what he wanted me for, when he knocked at a door, and walked in with me. King Albert was alone, and as that tall, stately figure came forward to meet us, I knew instinctively who it was. Speaking in English, in a deep and very deliberate voice, he greeted me with a few kindly words of welcome: 'Cap-tain Ferguson, I hope you will have a pleasant time here with us . . . though of course he went on to point out that it was hardly a time for enjoyment. That memory has never left me.'

## HAMPTON WILL HEAD SUMMER SCHOOL

Noted Teacher Will Offer Graduate Courses In Education

Dr. W. O. Hampton, for the past three years associated with the Mercer Summer School, will serve as head of the department of education for the coming summer session of the university, President Spright Dowell announced Tuesday. He takes the place of Dean Peyton Jacob, who recently resigned to become president of Southwestern college, in Americus.

Dr. Hampton, an alumnus of the University of North Carolina, will offer graduate courses in the education department at Mercer, Dr. Dowell said. He has been at Mercer for the past three summers but this is the first time he will act as chairman of the summer school.

Dr. Hampton, now is head of the New Hanover High school in Wilmington, N. C., where he has been for several years. He received his Ph.D. degree from Columbia university.

Dr. Dowell said he is pleased to obtain for the university a man as well trained and as well-known in educational circles as Dr. Hampton.

The summer session will begin June 13 and will last for 11 weeks. It will be the fourth quarter this year, practically all courses of the regular term being offered in addition to the new courses. Because of the large number of teachers registering for the summer session, Dr. Dowell said several other professors will be secured to teach in the education department.

## DEAN CLARK SPEAKS TO A. A. U. W.

"The New Deal In Foreign Affairs" Is Topic Of Talk

Dr. John B. Clark, dean of the arts college, addressed the American Association of University Women in Savannah, Ga., Thursday, February 23. Dr. Clark was invited to address the association by its state president, Mrs. J. K. Quattlebaum.

The subject of Dr. Clark's address was: "The New Deal in Foreign Affairs." The principal topics discussed were: a comparison of the tasks confronting the Roosevelt administration with those of former presidents; the London Economic Conference; the Allied War Debts; recognition of Russia; the New Deal in Latin-America; and the international aspects of peace.
