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can be stored in the classroom just behind the auditorium.

Flats First Item
A set of stage flats to represent a domestic interior is the first item on the building program. The light frames to be covered with unbleached muslin and painted are finished already. These panels of wall, each fifteen feet high and most of them five feet wide, can be shifted to place doors and windows at any desired position.

The next job on the program will be a proscenium arch of the picture-frame type. At the corners of the present chapel platform two light columns will support a light truss-structure that is being designed by H. O. Wheeler. When properly braced, this unit will carry the border lights and the curtain track.

Material for the front curtain has not yet been selected, but it will be fabric that can stand folding when the chapel is needed for non-dramatic purposes.

Both footlights and border lights will be portable. An outlet box can be mounted at some convenient place near where the electric wires enter the building, and the current led through a simple arrangement of dimmers. Some Little Theatres use a portable switch-board and dimmer box no larger

than a steamer trunk.
Mercer University has two able and experienced directors of dramatics on its faculty. Registrar James C. Shelburne is serving as director pro-tem for the Macon Little Theatre this quarter. In his absence and with his hearty approval Dr. Wilbur Stout is directing construction work as stage technician. Dr. Stout was an early member of the Carolina Playmaker group under the nationally known Professor Frederick H. Koch at the University of North Carolina.
