The expert blocking of Billy Smith, Morris, Tyson and the rest of the Mercer team made this run possible, for several times, the runner was almost brought down but was saved by the timely blocking of his teammates. From then on, the Orange and Black had little difficulty in checking the desperate last minute heaves of the Presidents, and the game ended a few seconds later with the score Mercer 30; Washington-Jefferson 7.
