BRUINS DROP CONTEST TO CLEMSON FOE

5,000 Fans See Bears Go Down To Crushing Defeat At Savannah

Before a crowd of 5,000 fans, the Clemson Tigers avenged last year's 15-0 defeat, by snowing the Mercer Bears under to the tune of 32-0. It was a victory of man power, with the Tigers sending in a new eleven every quarter to further harry the worn out Bears. Mercer had no reserves to cope with the swarm sent out from the other bench, and so the eleven men in orange jerseys fought a gallant battle to no avail.

The first half was rather evenly fought, although the Tigers did push over a touchdown in the waning seconds of the period. The score came as the culmination of

a sustained drive of 30 yards, with Hinson going over tackle from the three yard line for the six points. The extra point was converted, and the half ended with the Bears trailing by seven points.

In the last minute of the third quarter, the powerful Tigers scored their second touchdown from the three yard marker after a march of 50 yards. The Bears were tiring fast from the continued pounding of the two alternating Tiger elevens; nevertheless, they offered stiff resistance while their strength held out.

A jaded Bear team faced a fresh Tiger outfit, at the start of the fourth quarter, and then the Bear rout started. First, a long return of Bloodworth's punt placed the ball on the Mercer 20 yard line from which point Dillard scored over tackle. The second of the three touchdowns in the ill-fated fourth came when Bloodworth's punt was blocked on the Bear 13.

In six plays the Tigers had scored again.

Allen kicked to Lawton on the Clemson 25 and behind driving interference, the Tiger sophomore ran 75 yards for the fifth and last Tiger touchdown. The game ended a few seconds later with Allen desperately throwing passes in mid-field, in a futile attempt to stave off a complete shutout. Score: Clemson 32; Mercer 0.

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
