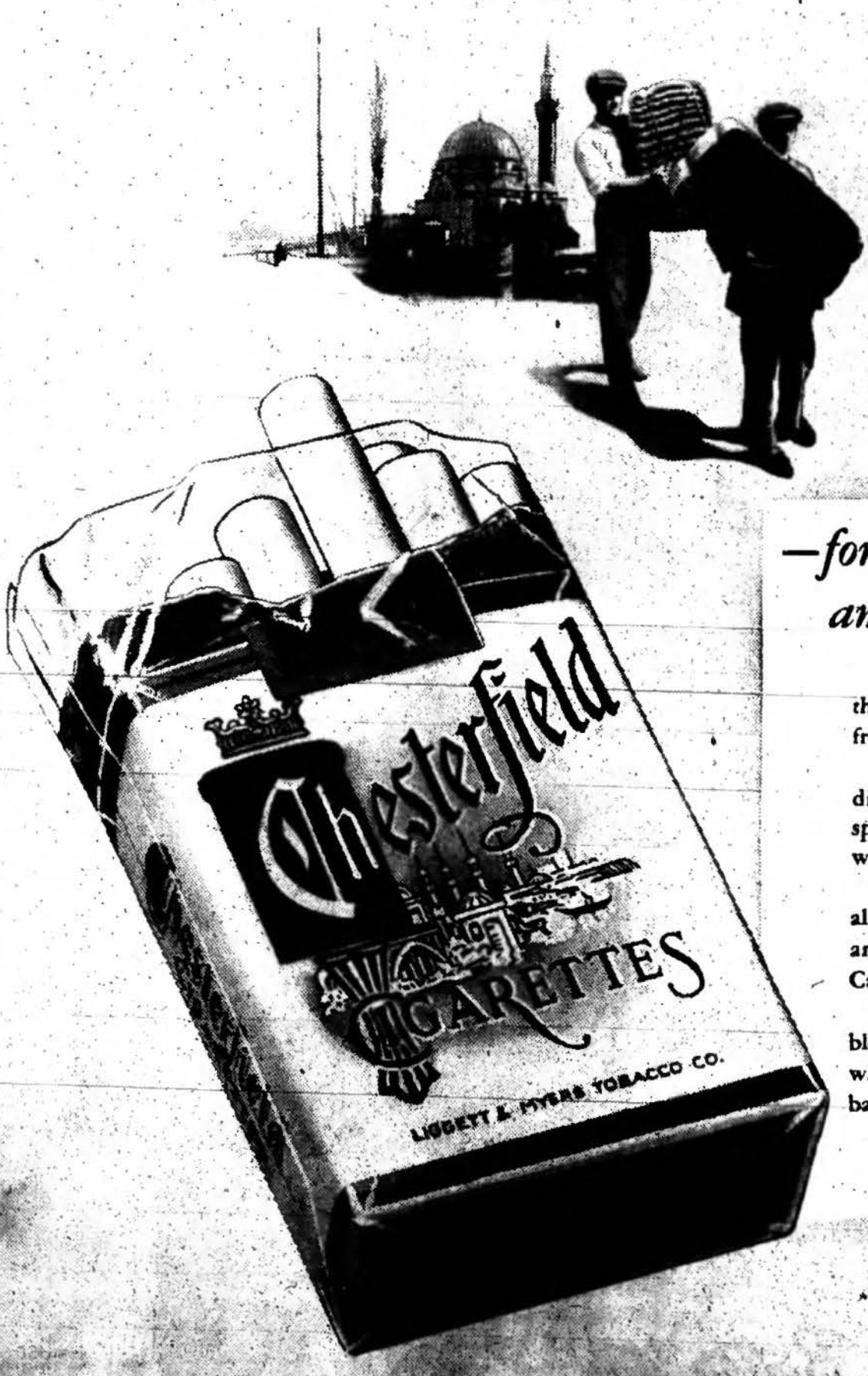
Tournament Will Begin Here Next Week, Ferguson Says
