In speaking of physical education, Dr. Matherly said: "In present-day athletics there is gradually evolving the notion that the attitude of the mind back of the muscles is more important than the muscles themselves. What we need is not student athletes but athletic students."

"The third prime function of education is the promotion of the moral and physical growth of the student," he continued. "Character is supreme; it is the basis of all successful living. Character is often confused with reputation. Character is what we are; reputation is what people think we are. Character is eternal and is everything; reputation is temporal and is nothing.
