Dr. F. C. McConnell concluded his series of religious addresses with rededication service for Mercer students in the university chapel this morning. His talk today ended the eighth annual Religious Emphasis Week held at Mercer.

Dr. McConnell spoke today on "Facing the Future" with his text taken from the first chapter of Philippians. The program included a selection by the Mercer Ministerial quartet, and ended with an invitation for all students to rededicate their lives to Christ.

Summary of Talks

A brief summary of Dr. McConnell's talks through the week follows:

Monday he spoke on the final commendation to be given us by Jesus Christ and how we might earn it. He took as his theme Jesus' words, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant." During this talk he brought out the point that "whatever you lose here (on earth) by doing right, you will gain a million times up yonder."

Need For Insight

In his Tuesday's address Dr. McConnell emphasized the need of all men for a spiritual insight and an understanding of the supernatural things of life. "Spiritual understanding and appreciation of things makes life worth while," he said. He also stated that there are many sources from which we can obtain material things, but there is a spiritual truth which comes from receptive hearts and responsive natures to God.

Students Hold Clinic At State Hospital

Alembic Club, Biology And Psychology Classes Visit Institution

The members of the Alembic club and biology and psychology classes were guests at an informal clinic last Friday which was held in the hospital of the State Insane Asylum at Milledgeville. Dr. Y. H. Yarbrough was in charge of the clinic.

Case Studies

The procedure consisted in the description of and explanation of the causes of typical mental abnormalities and deficiencies. Dr. Yarbrough pointed out the difference between insanity and mental deficiency. He said that people who were insane should be regarded as being "mentally sick". These people usually have a fair chance of recovery, according to Dr. Yarbrough. Some of the typical cases of insanity were exhibited.

Examples of insanity exhibited were: manic-depressors, dementia-praecox, incephalytis, paresis, and amnesia. Of these, the last three were caused purely from organic conditions. He exhibited four morose as examples of mental de-
