There has been expressed a desire for a student bulletin board. Now, there are two bulletin boards in the Co-op for posting of notices, Dean's lists, and the like, but these boards are not for the use of the students. They are, as stated before, for the use of the administration.

The CLUSTER would like to see a bulletin board placed on the campus for the personal use of the students. Notices of meetings, and the like could be placed on this board without the formality of administrative sanction and approval. Then, too, there are frequently posters and other material, that are prohibited from being displayed on the official board by their nature. Such matter would probably prove of interest to students. The CLUSTER is on the mailing list of several organizations, and material is frequently sent that could be advantageously displayed on such a board.

We do not suggest, of course, a bulletin board that students would be free to use for personal grudges or other ulterior motives, but a means of free expression for students or groups of students.
