MERCER LOSES TO MISSISSIPPI IN FINAL GAME

Crippled Bears Show Brave Spirit In Fighting Strong Opponents

SEVEN PLAY LAST GAME

Maroon Goal Threatened In First Quarter, But Large Crew of Subs Too Much

Mercer's crippled Bears journey ed to State College, Mississippi last week where they went down under a 32-0 defeat administered by the strong Southeastern Con serence team from Mississippi State in their last game of the 1936 season. The defeat featured the final performances of seven senior gridders who played their iast game for the Orange and Black, and it rang down the curtain on one of the most unsuccessul seasons in Mercer gridiron

Story Not in Score Although the margin of defeat was five touchdowns, the figures do not tell the whole story of the courageous fight put up by the local Baptists. With the game only a few minutes old, Phil Chastian, sophomore center for the Bears, brought the crowd to its feet when he made a one-handed interception of a State pass and returned it 38 yards to the Maroon 37 yard line. This was the first scoring threat of the game and, though the Maroops killed it immediately, they were ever reminded that the Bears were in there fighting and that they could not relax for a moment.

After repelling every State threat in the first quarter and part of the second, Mercer weakened under the constant battering and accurate passing attack of Pickle, Gelatka, and company to yield two Rainey touchdowns before intermission. Encouraged by a 62-yard touchdown gallop by halfback Ward early in the third period, the State juggernaut blocked a Mercer punt to score another in rapid succession, and could not be halted from there on. The Mississippi State first string retired in the fourth quarter in favor of the reserves Mercer who marched to the final score.


