 GEORGE GRANT: I am wholeheartedly against the proposed plan with reference to the Supreme Court, that check placed on the powers of the other branches of our government. When we destroy their right to pass upon the question of whether any law conflicts with our constitution, we, in effect, destroy the constitution itself—and no one can successfully deny, in my opinion, that the effect of the proposed plan is to deprive them of their constitutionally inherent right to pass on the validity of any law. I am very glad to see that many of our staunchest Democrats are opposed to this, showing that they are not so partisan as to destroy their ability to think clearly, and to rise up against this usurpation of the rights of the Supreme Court.

This person did not give a name: The proposed change in the Federal judiciary is a direct attempt to destroy the only strong protection of the liberties of the American people. It is truly contrary to the fundamental principles of our system of government and to those of the Real Democratic Party. The "stuffing" of the Supreme Court is an act of a Dictator and not an act of an American President.

best lawyers are enormous. Laborers then must seek justice and equality through the instrumentality of petty lawyers or shysters, for the reason that his insignificant salary cannot meet the financial requirements of the best lawyers, with the consequence that laborers loses and must pay the cost of the court, his attorney, and the ultimate expense of the judiciary.

President Roosevelt realized these difficulties and when he was swept into office, he began to legislate laws which would raise the standard of living for the laborers so that, they too, might have the best lawyers. All of this legislation was declared unconstitutional, by nine old men whose knowledge of the law is so great—that they have lost sight of the suffering of humanity. These men are not even representatives of the people; but are appointed by demagogic politicians. The decisions in regard to the invalidation of New Deal legislation has been five to four decisions all the way through. The truth of the matter is that these five justices have sought to ascend to the position of Dictators, in declaring the will of the people, as invested in the congress, void and invalidated. These five justices were appointed by a capitalistic administration under the Republican rule, and they owe their allegiance, not to the people, but to the money makers.

Now we come to the real issue: Shall we continue to tolerate this despotic rule of the five justices; or shall we back President Roosevelt in his proposed court changes for the sake of progress and in the interest of humanity? No truthful non-partisan will deny the truth of what has already been said, and no true American, whether he be a partisan or a non-partisan, that if we submit to the dictatorship of the almighty five justices our National progress is doomed and we can expect social disintegration. Mr. John R. L. Smith used the term progress repeatedly and I wondered if this learned man really knew the meaning of the word. At any rate Dr. Weaver amply expressed the sentiment of the rank and file, when he declared his support for the proposed changes. It is either court changes or Social Revolution; and my only objection is that, President Roosevelt should have demanded the abolition, rather than the mere revision of the Supreme Court of the United States.
