DEAN'S LIST IS SLICED TO 583

Only 2739 Students Make Required Marks During The Winter Quarter

Out of 3050 students enrolled, only 2739 succeeded in making the Dean's list during the previous quarter. This figure represents a drop of 583 from the fall quarter. The sudden drop is probably due to the change in requirements for the Dean's list. Formerly, the requirements were only three A's; however the required marks for the last quarter were raised to two A's and an A.

Wean Clark was quite displeased with the poor showings for last quarter. "My scepticism has evidently failed," he stated. "We were surpassed by Harvard and the University of California," he added.

Nearly 500 dependent students have stated intentions of resigning from Wercer because of their failure to make the necessary marks for the Dean's list.

Dr. Richardson, head of the chemistry department, reported that all but one out of the organic chemistry class of 487 failed to make an A. "Frankly, I am sorry that I had to give the boy only an A," he stated.
