 about courses offered in the Arts college, the Law school, and the Graduate department. The following will be listed as degrees offered by Mercer: bachelor of arts (A.B.), bachelor of science (B.S.), for pre-medical students who complete the three-year course at Mercer with an additional year in an approved medical college, bachelor of laws (LL.B.) and master of arts (M.A.).
 According to the catalogue the curricula offered is divided into three fields of study. The first is Humanities which includes courses in Christianity, philosophy, and languages. Second is Social Sciences covering in economics, education, history, journalism, law, psychology, and public speaking, while the last is Natural Sciences including courses in astronomy, biology, chemistry, mathematics, and physics.
 Also included in the new edition will be a short paragraph on each student organization, a calendar of university activities for the next school year, and a roster of students registered this year.
