

CONSTITUTION

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ment elections and each candidate must qualify as provided in Article II, Section 3, of this Constitution except that they shall deposit only 50c with the Secretary of the Student Government rather than \$1.00. The election of officers of the freshman class shall be held on the second Tuesday in October of each college year or within one week thereafter at the discretion of the Student Council.

**ARTICLE VIII
Cheer Leaders.**

Section 1. There shall be elected each year ten days after student elections one cheer leader and one assistant cheer leader. The second assistant cheer leader shall be selected as soon as possible after the beginning of the fall quarter following elections.

(a) These cheer leaders shall be selected by a committee composed of the newly elected (1) president of the Student Government; (2) vice-president of the Student Government; (3) president of the "M" club; (4) Captain of the football team; (5) the athletic coach of the University.

(b) In the event that the president of the M club and the captain of the football team are one and the same person, the captain of the basketball team shall also act on the committee.

(c) The president of the Student Government shall be chairman of said committee.

These cheer leaders shall be selected from candidates who have demonstrated their ability as cheer leaders before the Student Body.

**ARTICLE IX
Amendments.**

Section 1. An amendment to this constitution may be proposed by a vote of two-thirds of the Student Council, or by a petition signed by one-half of the bona fide students of the University. After being published in the college newspaper for two weeks, the proposed amendment must be referred to the student body for its ratification or rejection.

(a) When an amendment receives a majority vote of the students voting thereon, it shall become a part of the constitution, provided, however, that no action is valid except participated in by at least a majority of the students.

**ARTICLE X
Ratification.**

This constitution shall become the official constitution of the students of Mercer University when ratified by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the student body and by the President and faculty of the University.

ARTICLE XI

In the event of ratification, copies of this constitution shall be filed in the offices of the President of the University, the Secretary of the faculty.

**ADVICE TO SENIORS
SEEKING EMPLOYMENT**

PHILADELPHIA, PA. — (ACP) — Many seniors qualified to hold positions fail to land them because they bungle the first interview with their might-have-been employer.

For this reason, Dr. Clarence E. Clewell, director of the University of Pennsylvania's placement service, and his assistants advise seniors what not to say:

"I am willing to accept any job you offer me."

"Explain what you have done, can do and want to do. Should the question of salary arise, do not respond that you are willing to work for practically nothing, for the employer will judge you worthy of no more. State the minimum wage acceptable."

"Sincerity, modesty and good manners are most essential. Avoid personal inquiries and crude curiosity, such as attempting to read correspondence or other papers lying on the interviewer's desk; listening to his telephone conversa-

tion or interrupting another speaker.

"Look the interviewer in the eye while conversing; sit erect; be alert, pleasant, consistent and determined, but do not take too much of his time."
