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were particularly significant. Thus 87.3% of the A men fell in that group, 32.2% of the B's, 25.7% of the C's, 28.3% of the D's and 15.3% of the E's.

The result of this survey indicated definitely the superiority of the A's over the B's, the B's over the C's, the C's over the D's and the D's over the E's. The superiority was marked and consistent.

Of course, interpretations of this survey may differ. It does not mean that high grades in Law School will insure success at the Bar. It is more likely that it means that the type of student who possessed sufficient intelligence, ambition, industry and personality to succeed in Law School will find those same qualities of value in the practice. It also means that the knowledge gained in Law School is beneficial

No student is permitted in the reserve section or in the stacks, except by special permission.

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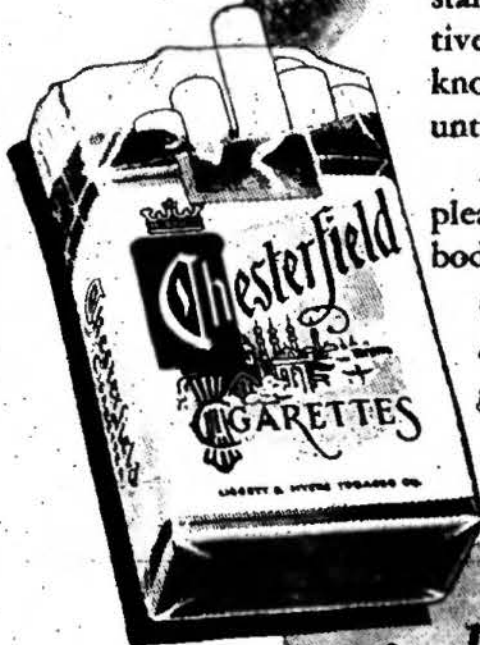


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
