

# MERCER SUMMER SESSIONS TO BEGIN JUNE 13

## High Schoolers Can Begin Study On College Work

### Dr. Highsmith Announces Plans For Courses, Faculty For Two Terms

Sessions of the Mercer summer school will begin June 13 for the first term and July 21 for the second term, Dr. E. M. Highsmith, director, announced yesterday.

High school seniors who graduate this June will be allowed to begin study at Mercer this summer, Dr. Highsmith said, and will receive full credit toward any degree.

Junior college courses will be offered for freshmen and sophomores, senior college courses for juniors and seniors, and graduate courses and seminars for other students.

"Many courses not offered during the regular college year will be given this summer," the director stated.

Featured courses will include those on Rural Life Problems, Educational Guidance, Library Science, Music Appreciation, and Electron and Radio Theories.

High school students who will not graduate this year can study senior high school courses at the Mercer summer school, it was stated.

A number of the regular Mercer faculty members will teach at the summer school and 10 additional instructors outside of Macon have been engaged for certain courses.

Arrangements have been made for a number of entertainments throughout the summer, Dr. Highsmith explained, including chapel-assembly programs, and recreation tours and excursions directed by Prof. G. L. Carver.

Any public school teacher, principal or superintendent may register for four class hours a day, according to the summer school regulations. Teachers doing this will receive 10 quarter hours credit. Mercer students will be allowed to take only the regular three courses, however.

"Mercer has a liberal policy of accepting credits earned in other accredited institutions," the director pointed out, "and this applies to summer session students equally with full-time, regular-session students."

Entrance regulations for high school students include graduation from a four-year accredited high school or a three-year senior high school, and 15 acceptable high school units including three in English, two in mathematics, one in history, one in science and either

## Nine Prominent Educators Added To Summer Faculty

Nine prominent educators have been added to the faculty of the Mercer summer school, Dr. E. M. Highsmith, director of the summer session, announced this week.

Dr. W. O. Hampton, professor of education at Georgia Southwestern College at Americus, will teach courses in education. He is chairman of the committee on personnel and guidance of the Georgia university system and is listed in Who's Who in American Education. Other accomplishments include service on the North Carolina textbook committee and a period of teaching in the Missouri public schools. In the Missouri schools, in which Dr. Hampton taught nine years, he served part of the time as high school superintendent and principal. For the past three summers he has taught in the University of Tennessee summer school. Dr. Hampton has accepted a teaching position with North Georgia College at Dahlonega and will go there in the fall.

Another professor of education will be Dr. E. V. Whelchel, superintendent of the Sparks-Adel schools at Adel. He has served as

In addition to the summer school, plans are being advanced for extension courses to be taught by Mercer during 1938 and 1939 and beginning in September, Dr. Highsmith said.

Scattered over the two term session they will include tours of the Ocmulgee, Indian Mounds, the Kaolin Mines at Dry Branch, and the Piedmont Rehabilitation project. Dr. G. L. Carver, director of the tours plans a special July Fourth schedule for those students remaining at the University over the holiday.

Short and interesting chapel programs are being arranged and will be presented on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday of each week.
