10. An impartial board of judges will decide the winners. All decisions are final.

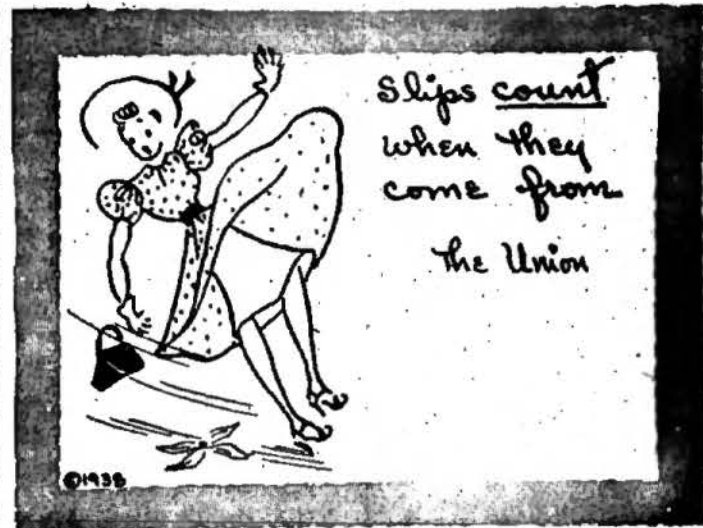
